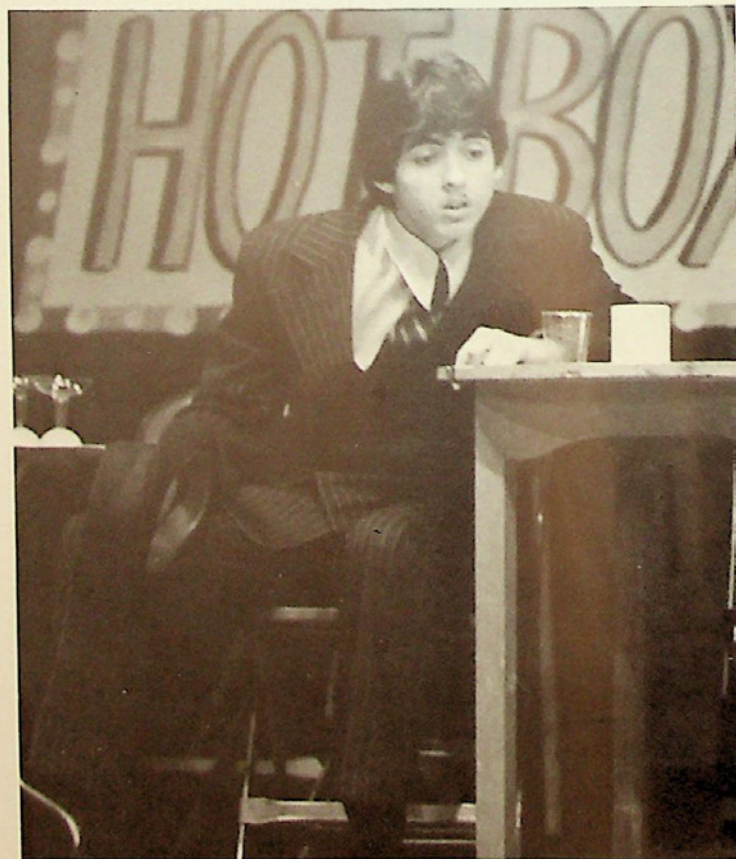

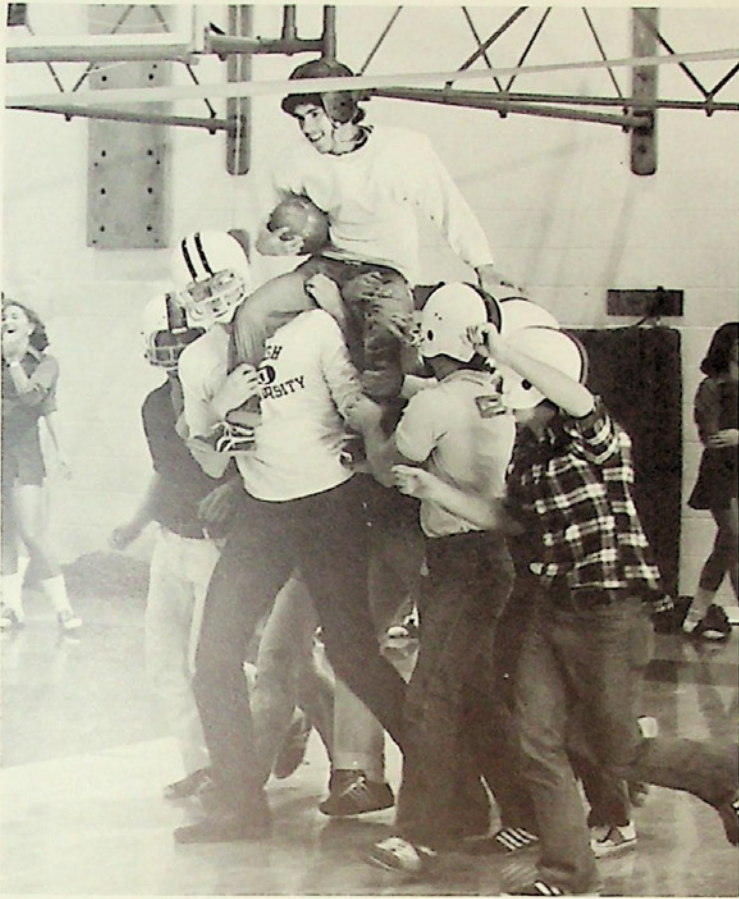

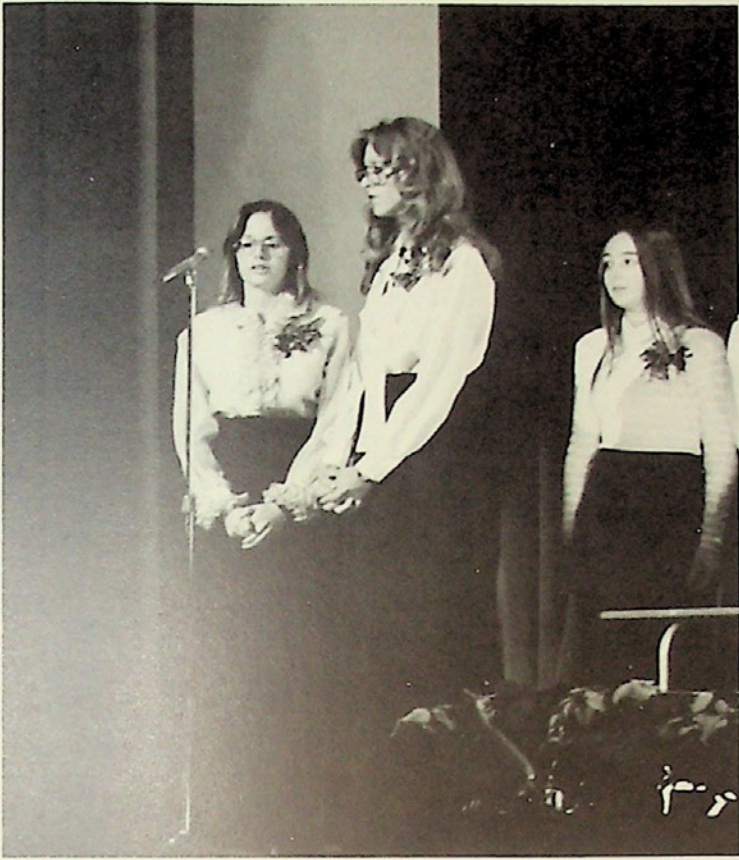

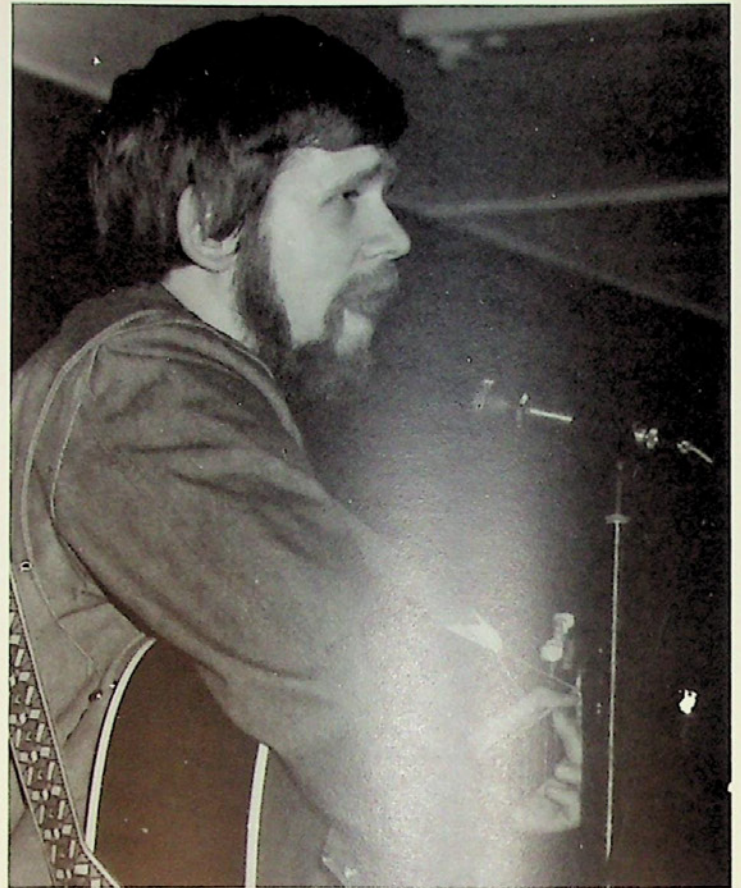

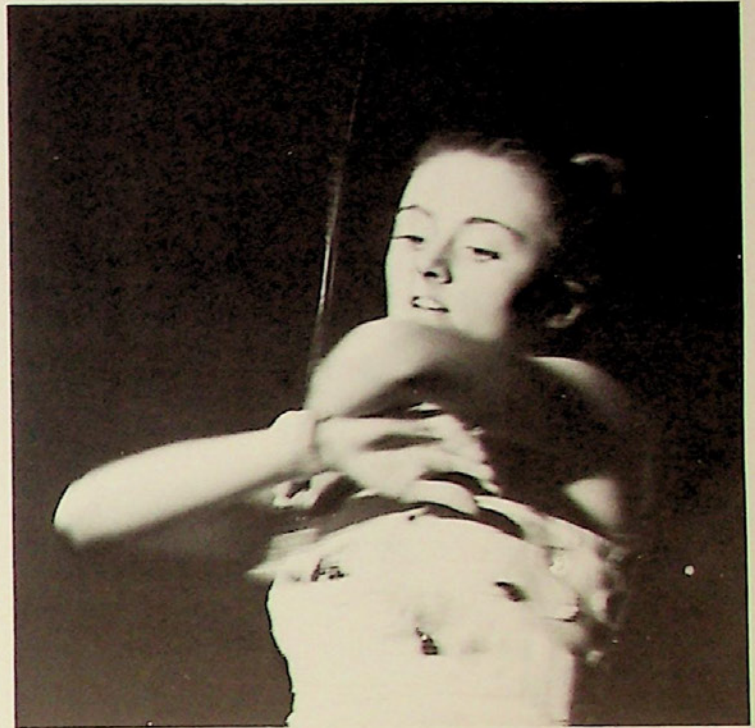

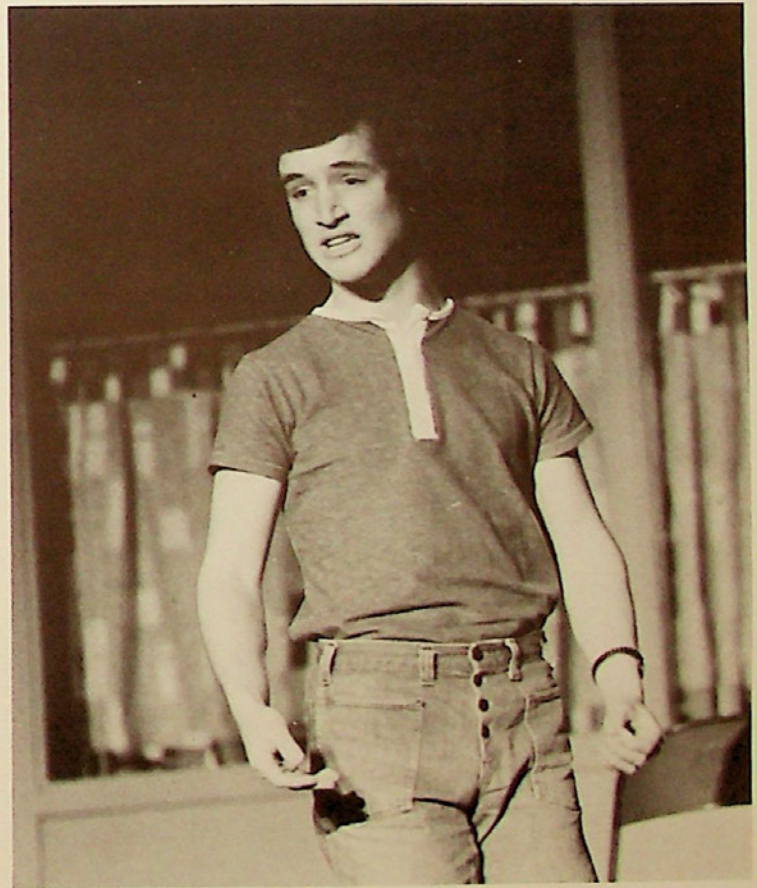

# Liberty Grenadiers celebrate 50th year with great concert

On Friday and Saturday nights, March 26 and 27, the Liberty High School Memorial Gymnasium rang out with the heralding of trumpets, the vibrations of drums, and the ever-familiar cry of bagpipes. These two evenings commemorated the 50th anniversary of the Liberty High School Grenadier Band.

The concert began with two fanfares played by an octet of herald trumpets, a marching review of the first company of the Grenadiers, and the Pipes and Drums. This was followed by the playing of the band's trademark, "Rule Britannia." "Golden Jubilee," written in 1928 by John Philip Sousa, was the next number on the program. With the LHS Grenadiers celebrating their 50th anniversary, no march could have been more appropriate to the occasion.

The band also featured a guest appearance by Dr. Joseph Ricipito, who conducted two selections, "Poet and Peasant" and "On the Mall." Dr. Ricipito organized the Liberty band in 1926 and presented the first concert on February 3, 1927. He served as director of the organization from 1926 to 1961 when Mr. Sherry arrived. During the march "On the Mall," Dr. Ricipito urged the audience to participate by singing along. The spectators did just that and with a great deal of enthusiasm which seemed to suggest that all were enjoying themselves quite thoroughly.

Highlighting the program was a trumpet solo by Greg Seifert, who displayed expertise in his performance of "Danza Allegre." The Highland Dancers, majorettes, and color guard also provided fine routines. This year the Lone Piper was Pipe Major Mike Masters who, along with the entire Pipe Corps, did an excellent job. During the concert the Raymond Hoffert Award for outstanding service was presented to Senior Officer Bill Delp.

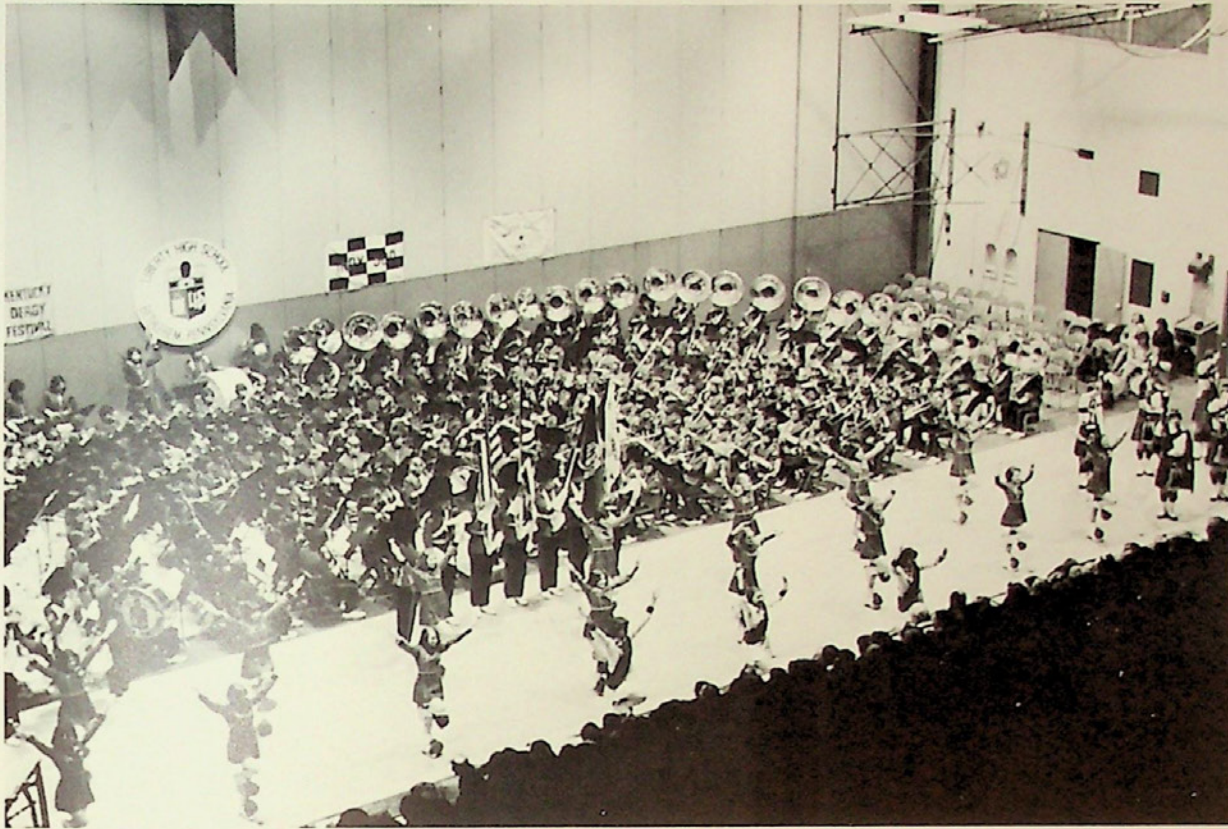

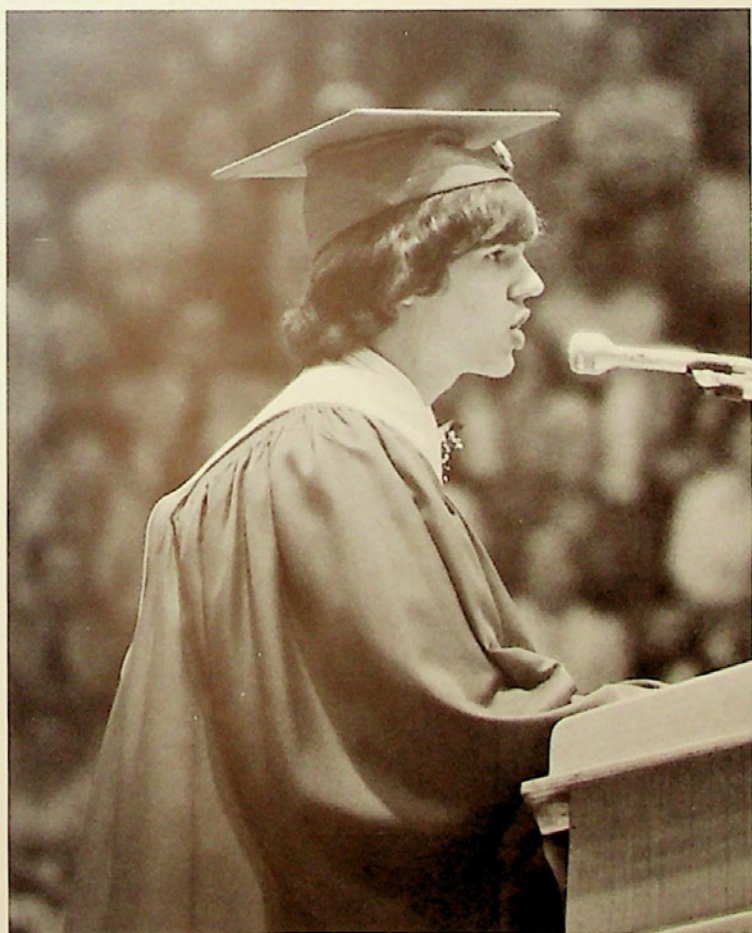

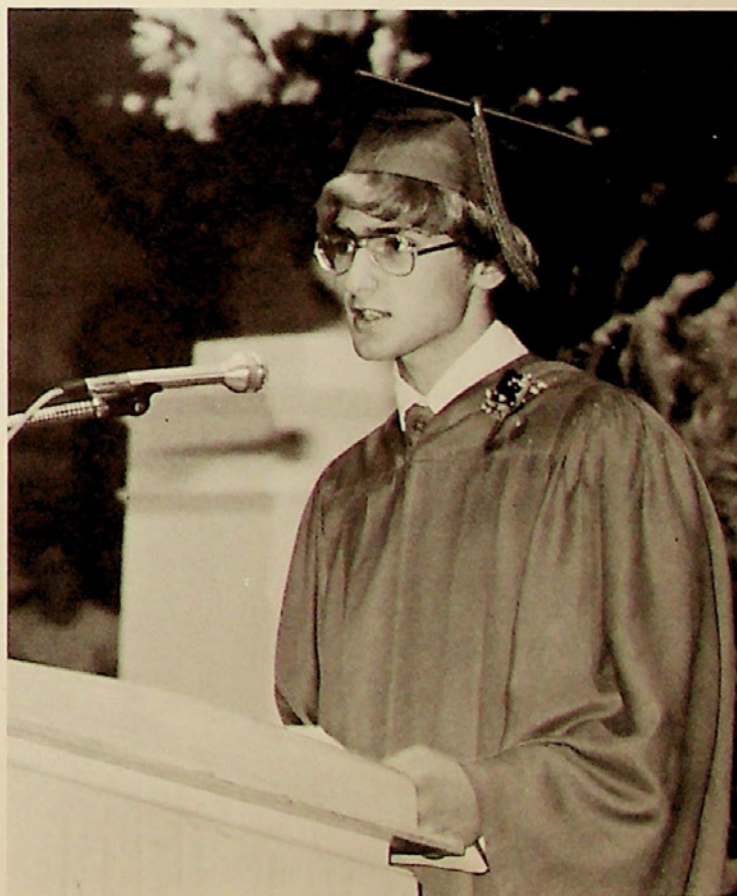

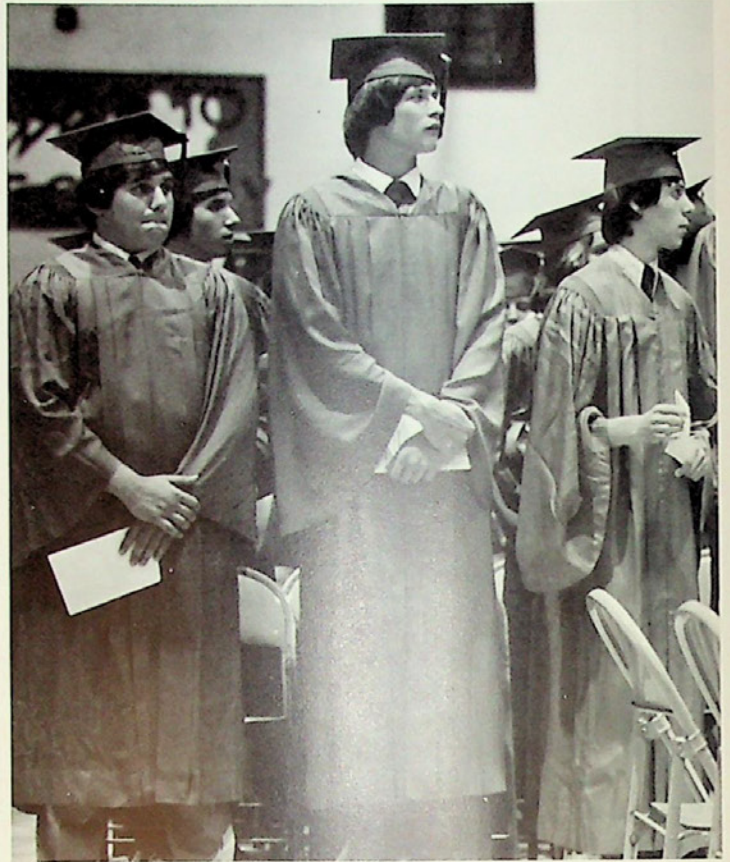

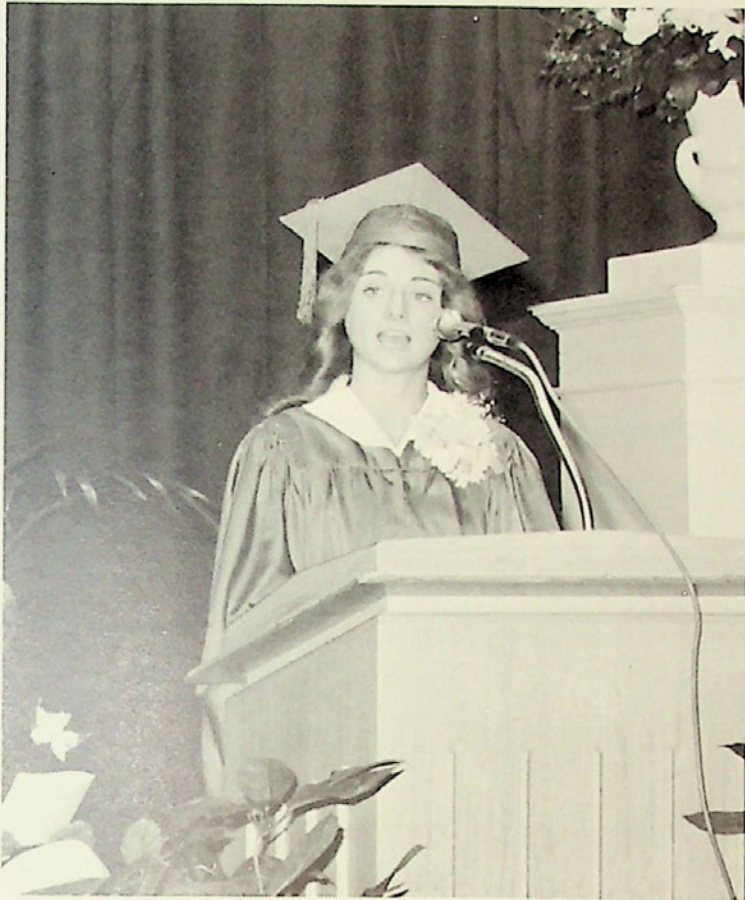

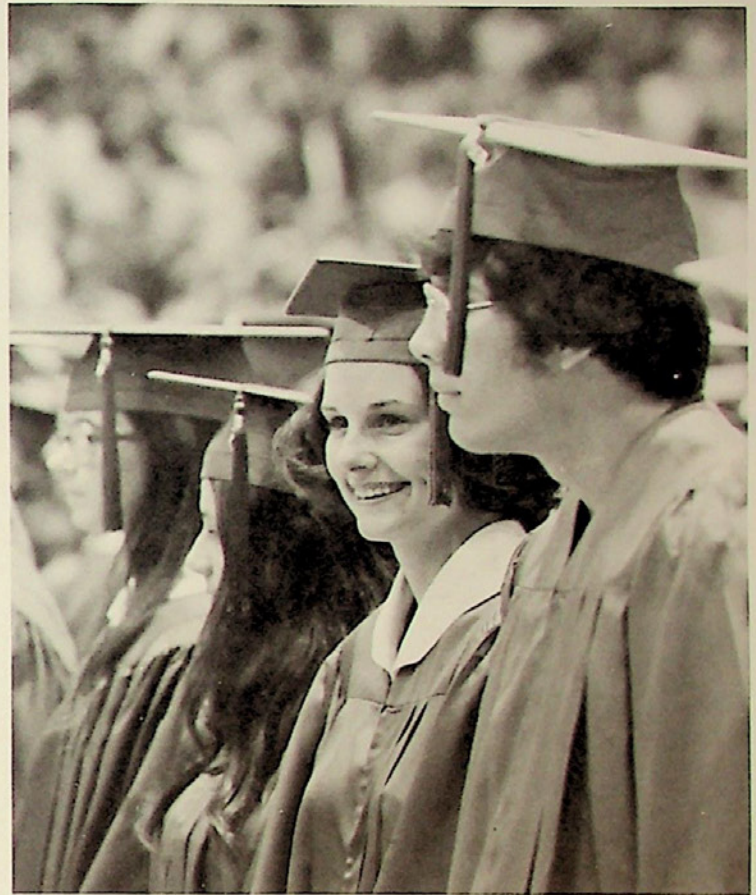

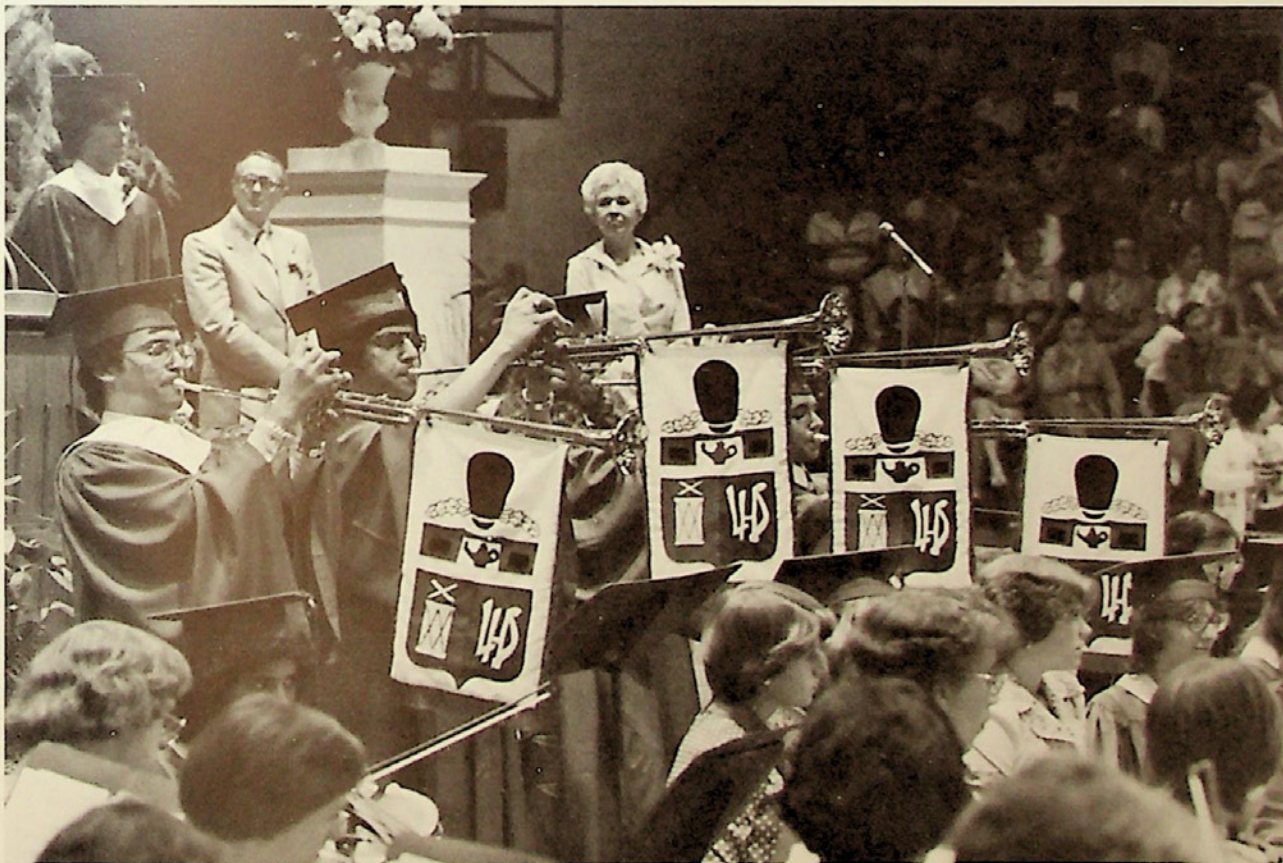

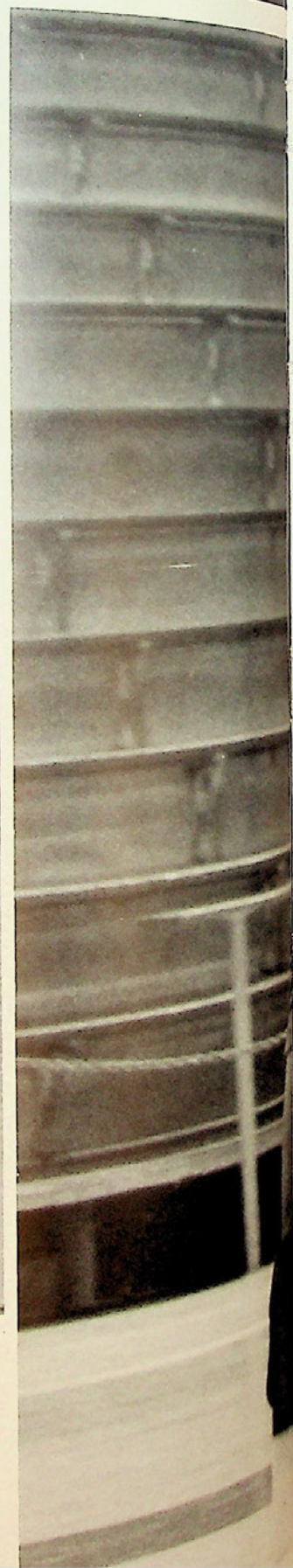

John Sittler, Matt Chase, Brian Petresky, and Gary Gunkle, all seniors, will be missed next year, but with a solid nucleus of underclassmen led by offensive-minded Joe Kovacs and veteran goalie John Guidon, the tradition will surely linger on.

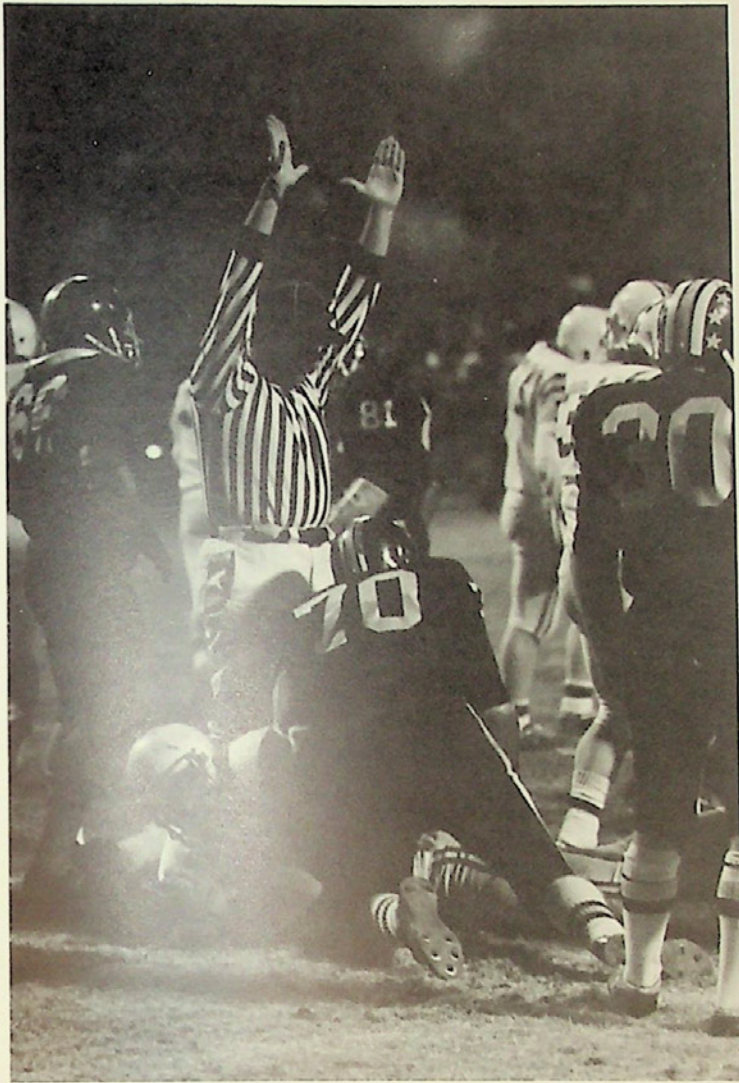

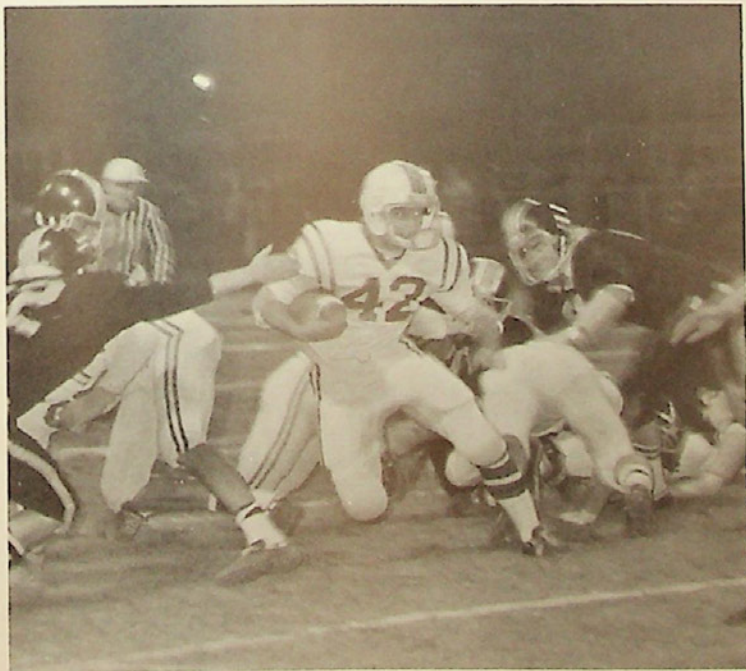

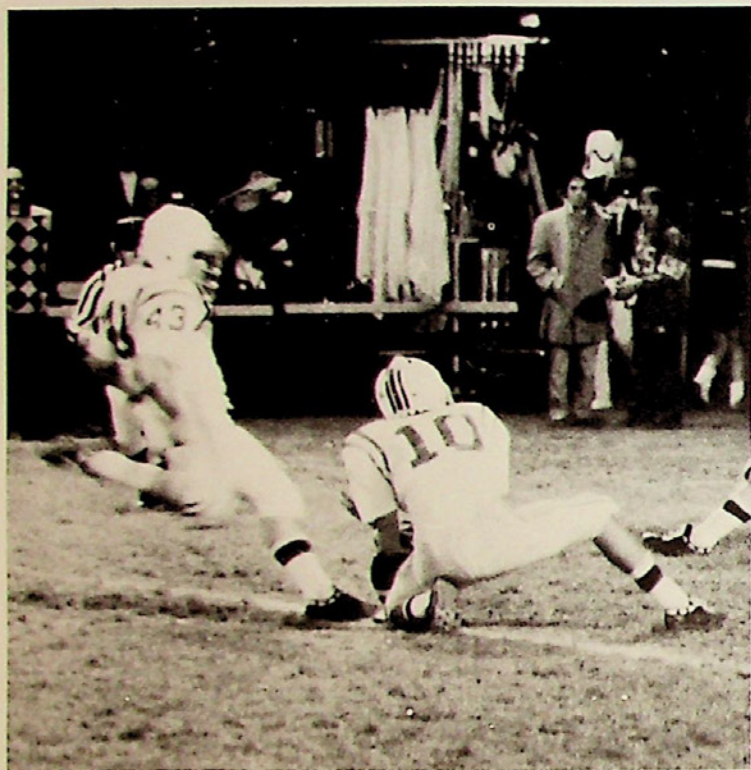
## Gridders overcome ills, inexperience to notch winning campaign

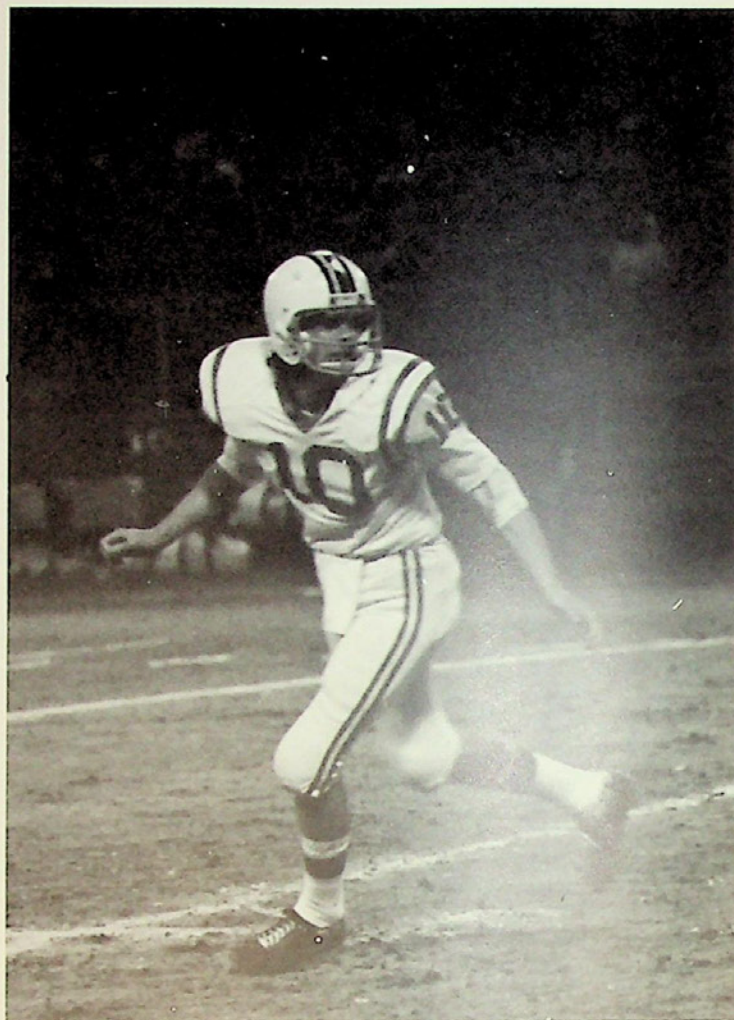
But Coach Barry Fetterman and his team had some surprises for the pessimists in the stands as witnessed by Liberty's thoroughly enjoyable 14-7 victory over Becahi in the same game which marked Erney's departure. Junior Mike Marich was thrown into the breach at quarterback and performed admirably. Another second-year man, Running Back Tim Posivak, showed that the flashes of brilliance seen last season were no fluke as he pounded away inside and rabbited outside on his way to a 1000-yard season and the Ripper Rich Trophy as the top scorer in the city. His most outstanding performance came against Allen where, behind the crunching blocks of Senior Fullback Ron Davis, he amassed 307 yards rushing and tallied four times in a 41-14 rout of the Canaries.

On the other side of the ledger, a sturdy defense, anchored by Co-captains Kevin Cousins and Dave Dorrow and Senior Defensive Back Terry Moore, made opponents pay a stiff price for every yard gained.

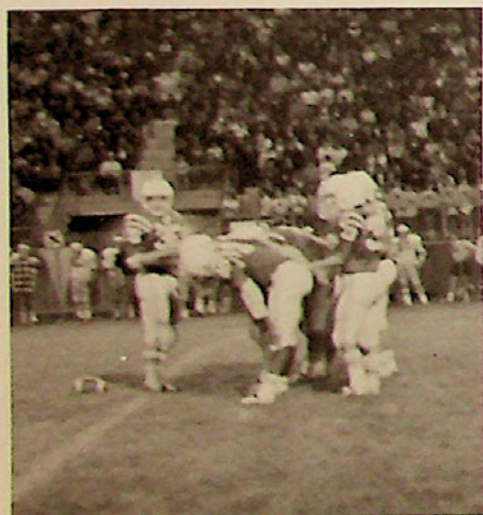
Highlighting the year was the Hurricane's impressive win over Dieruff, a team rated early in the season as one of the five best in the state. Unfortunately a last-second field goal by Emmaus, an uninspired 7-7 stalemate against an easily beatable Reading team, and a run-in with Whitehall, the area "Super Team" for 1976, put some blemishes on the Hurricane's record and served as a reminder that the "We're No. 1!" chant would have to be shelved for at least a year. 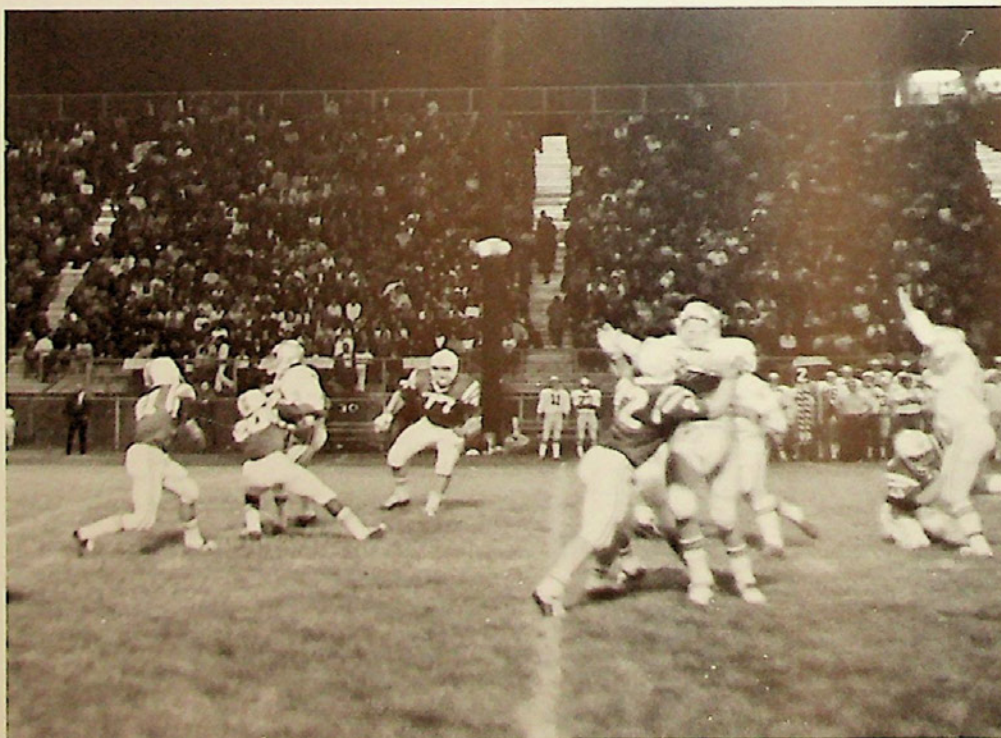
Winding up for an extra point attempt is Joe Castro.



With Erney gone, Mike Marich took the helm and ran the team well.

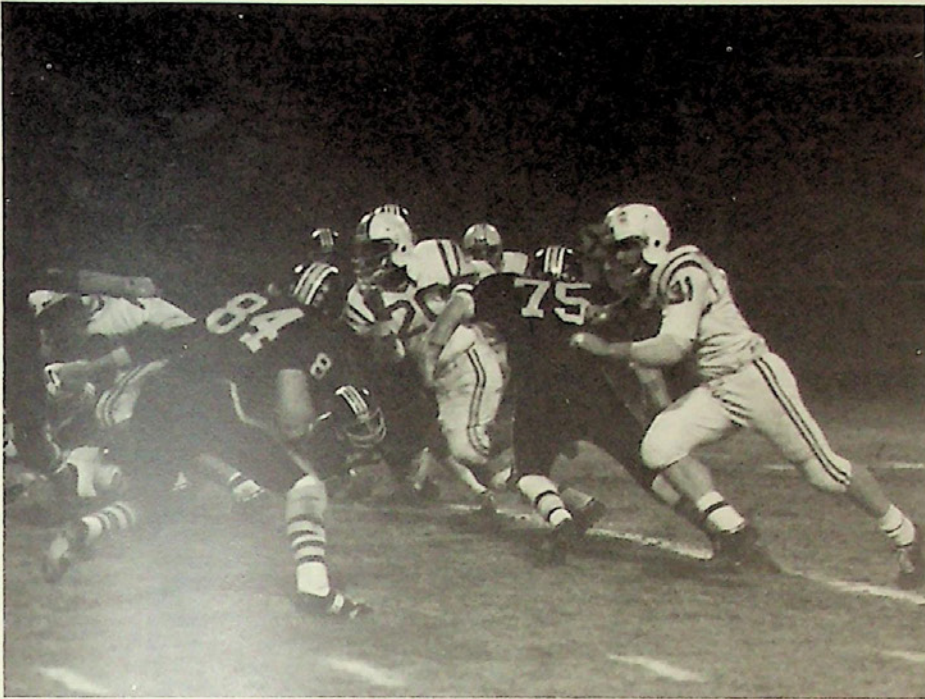


Terry Moore checks with the coaches before calling the defensive alignment.



Behind excellent blocking, Howie Erney unloads a pass to Wide Receiver Joe June for a first down early in the Bethlehem Catholic contest.





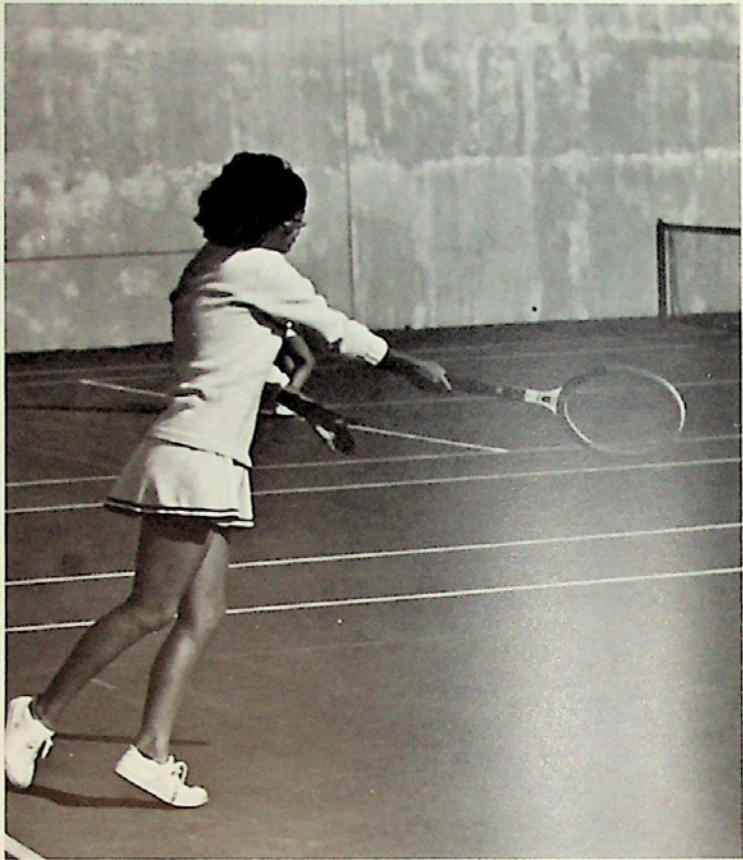
Fullback Ron Davis finds daylight and heads for a seven-yard gain against Freedom.

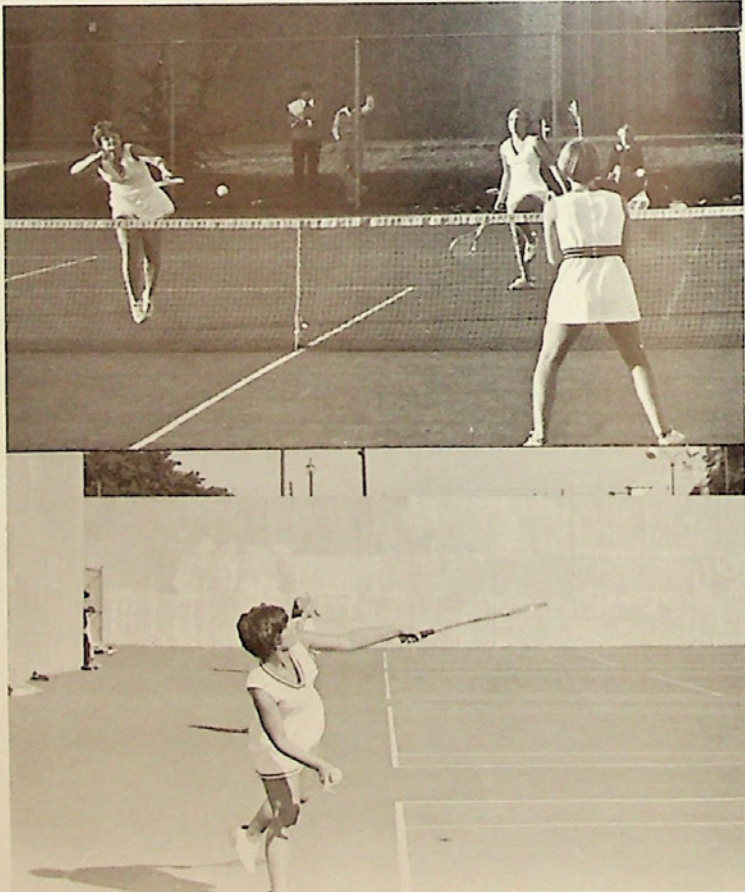

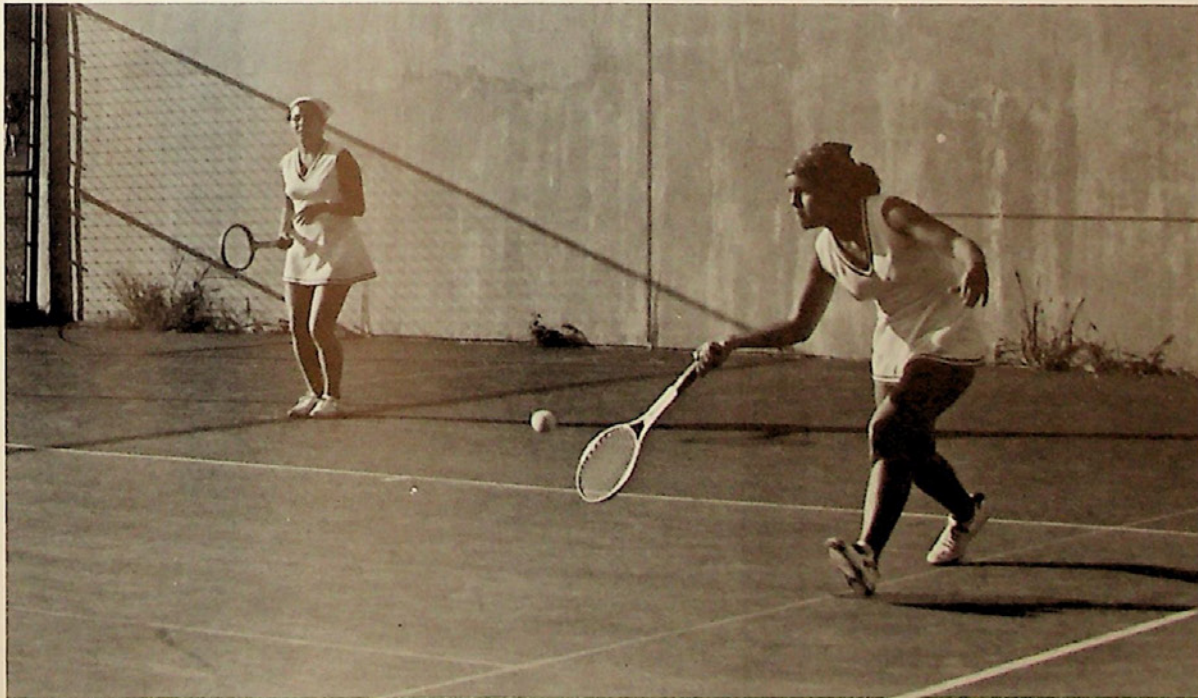

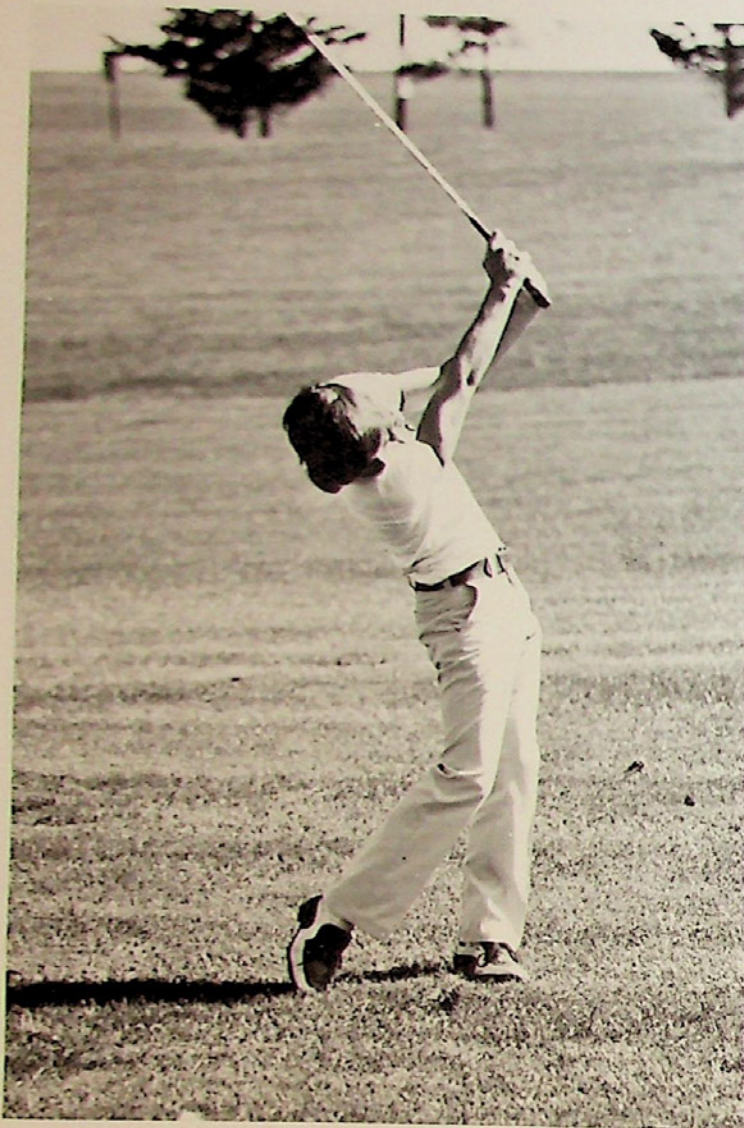

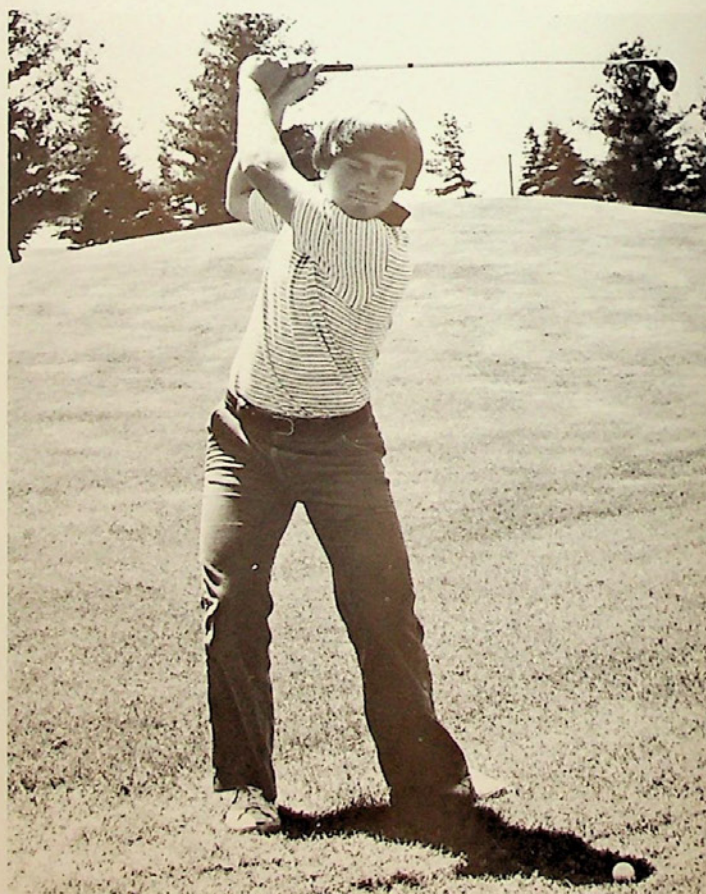


Jamie Shaffer drives one down the fairway against Dieruff.

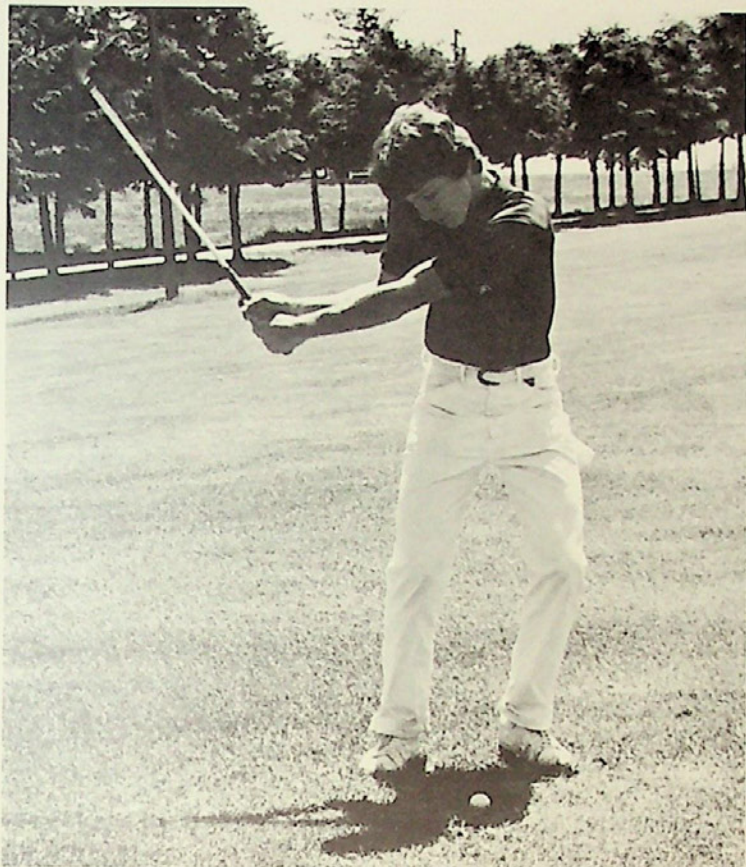


Watching the flight of the ball is Miguel Biamon.

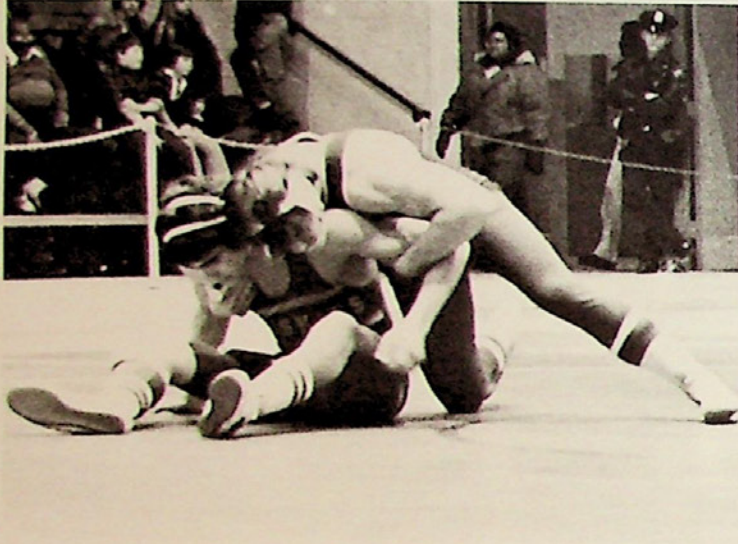

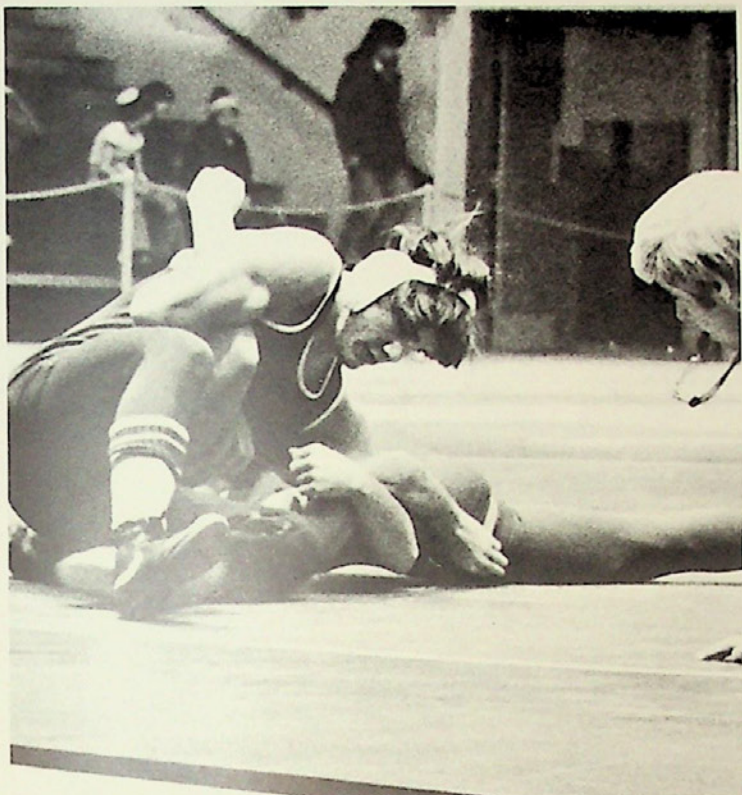

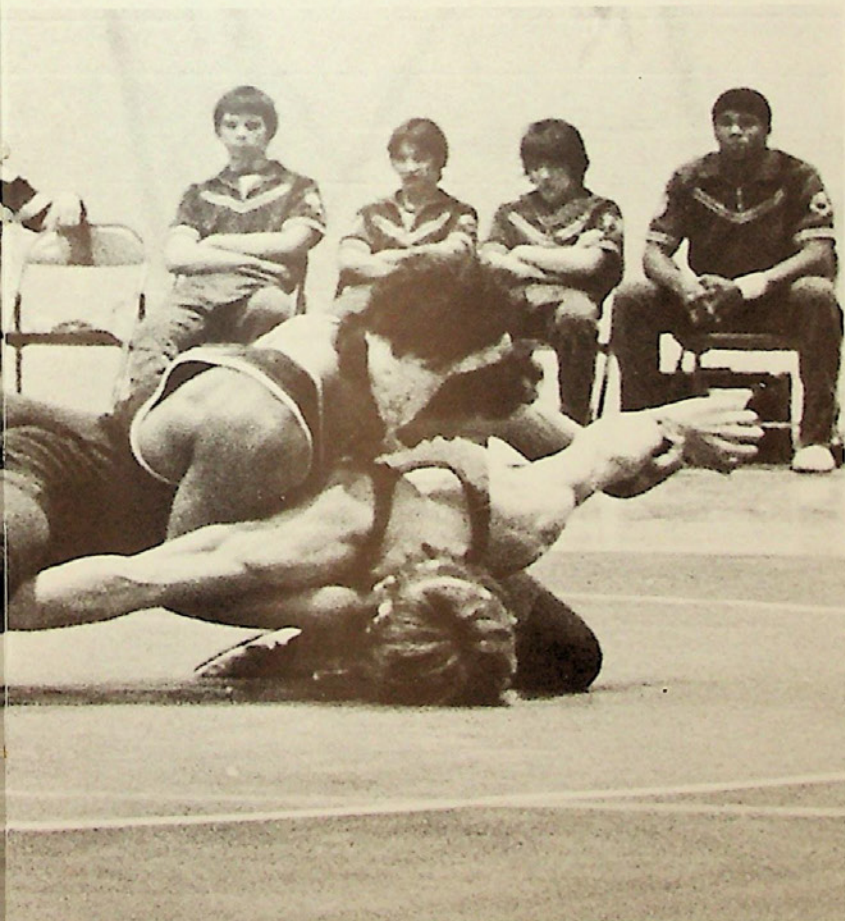


In neutral position, Senior Mark Hoffman considers his next move.

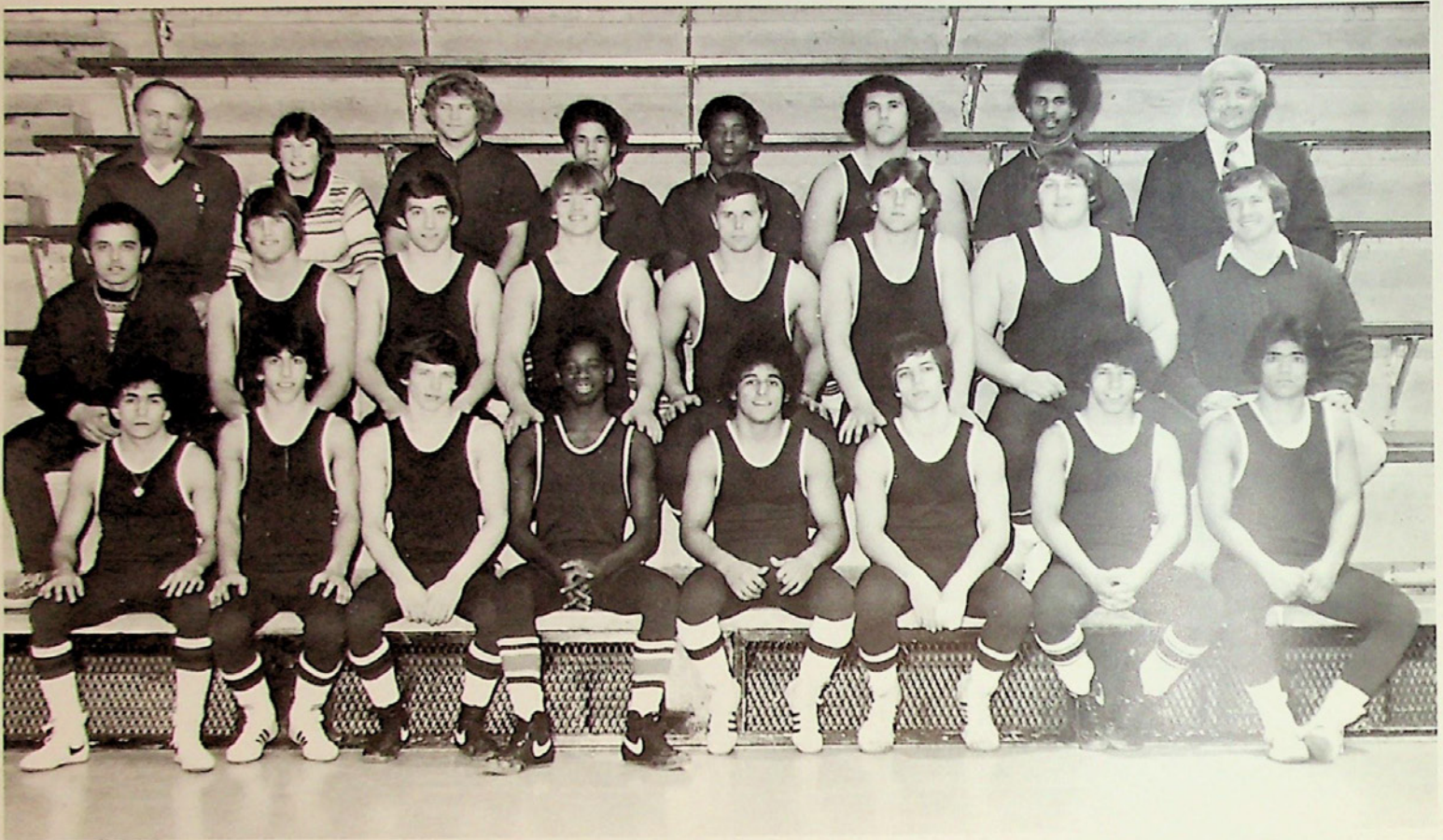
## Hurricane captures district championship in year of successes

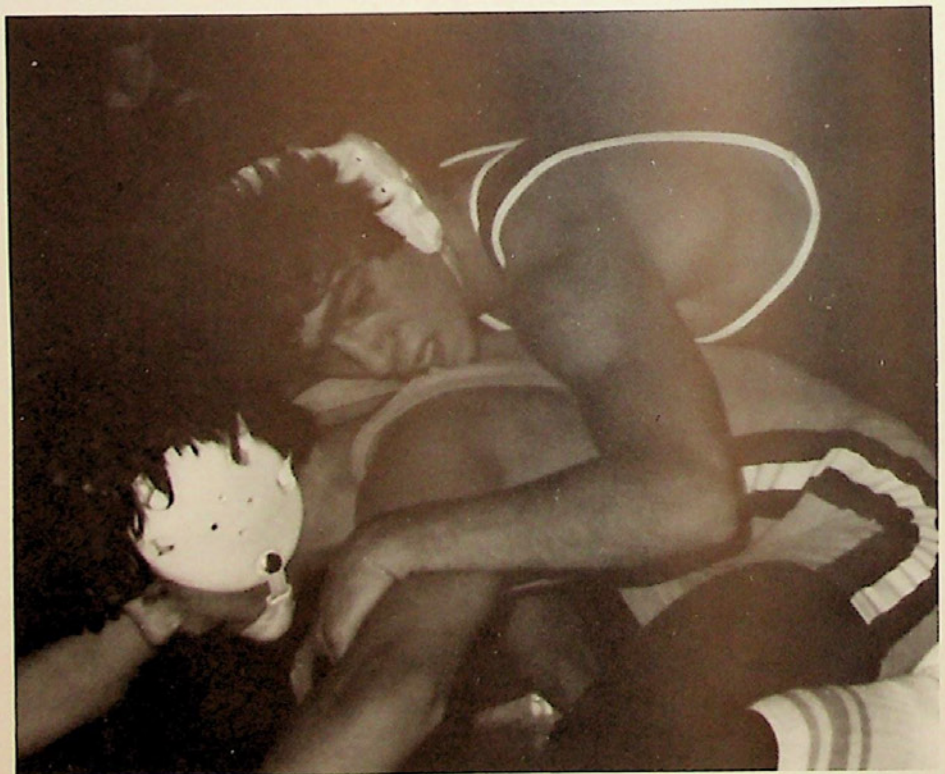

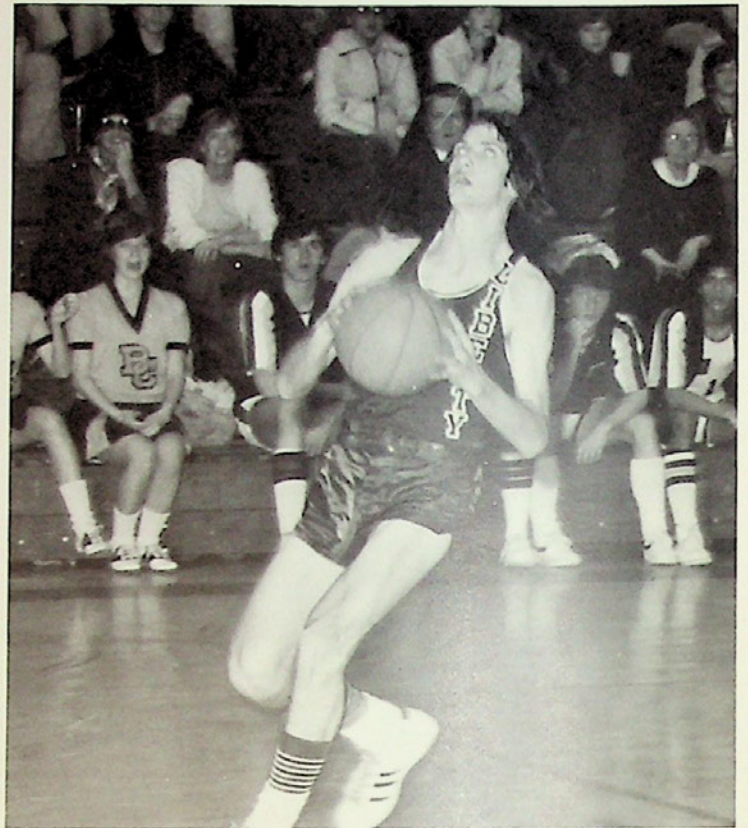

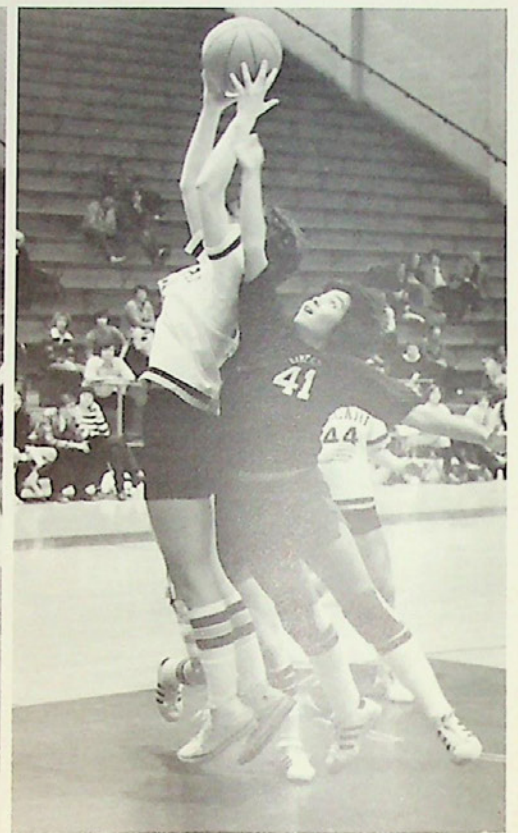

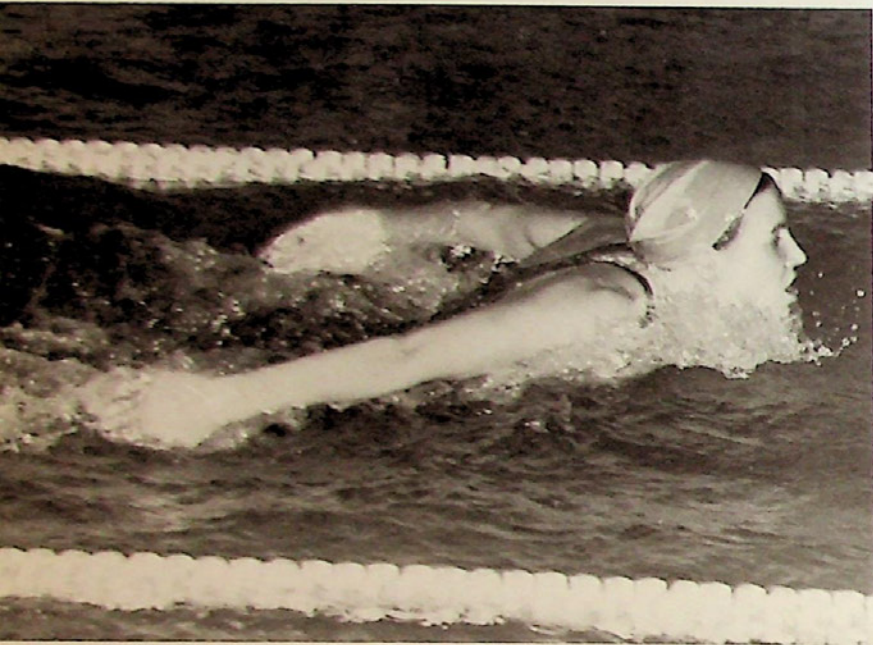
## Biamon district champ for winning swim team

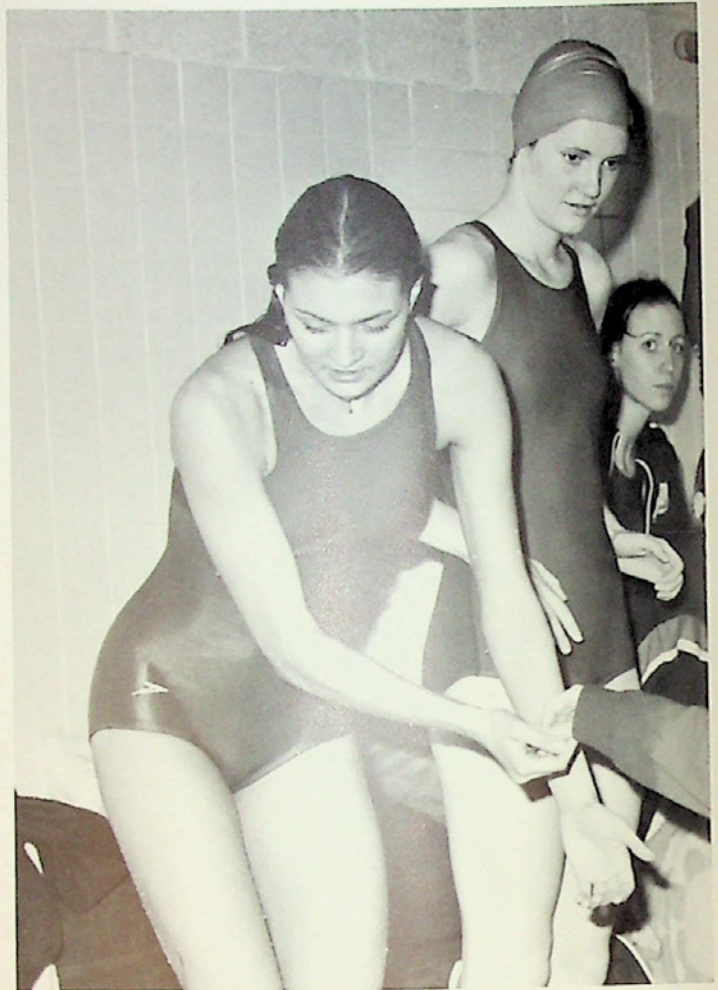

Coach Bob Snyder offers advice during a break in the competition.

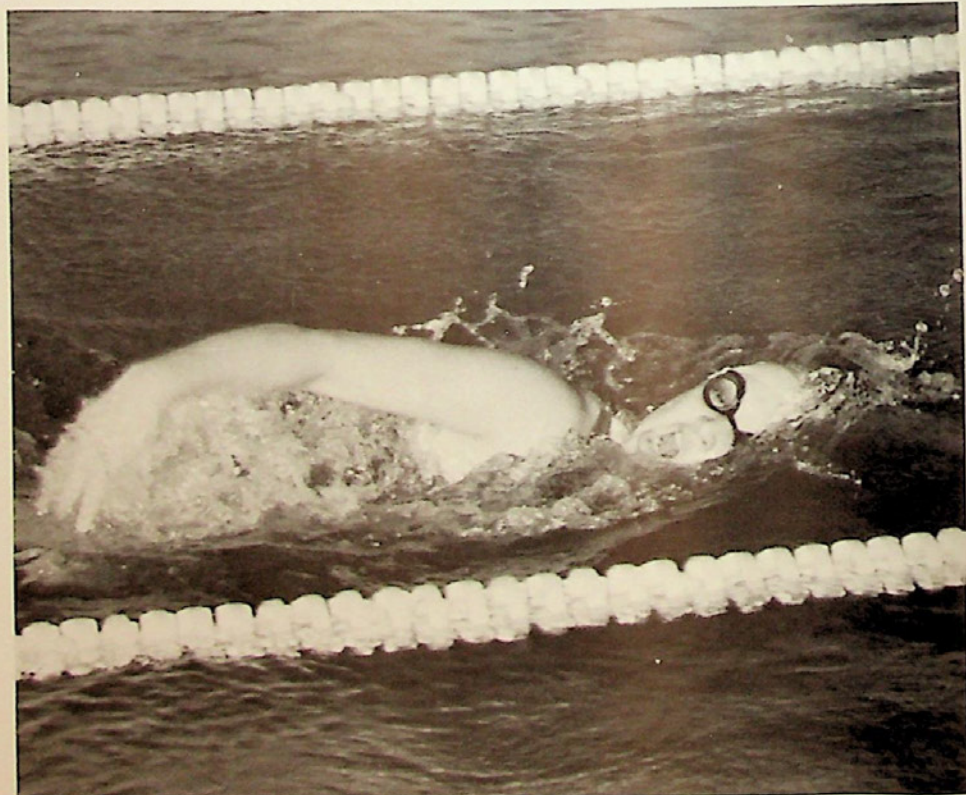

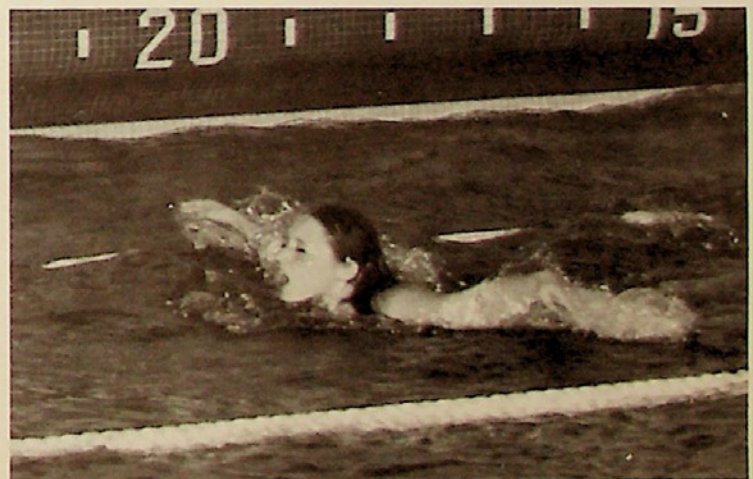
## Talented girl swimmers post winning season

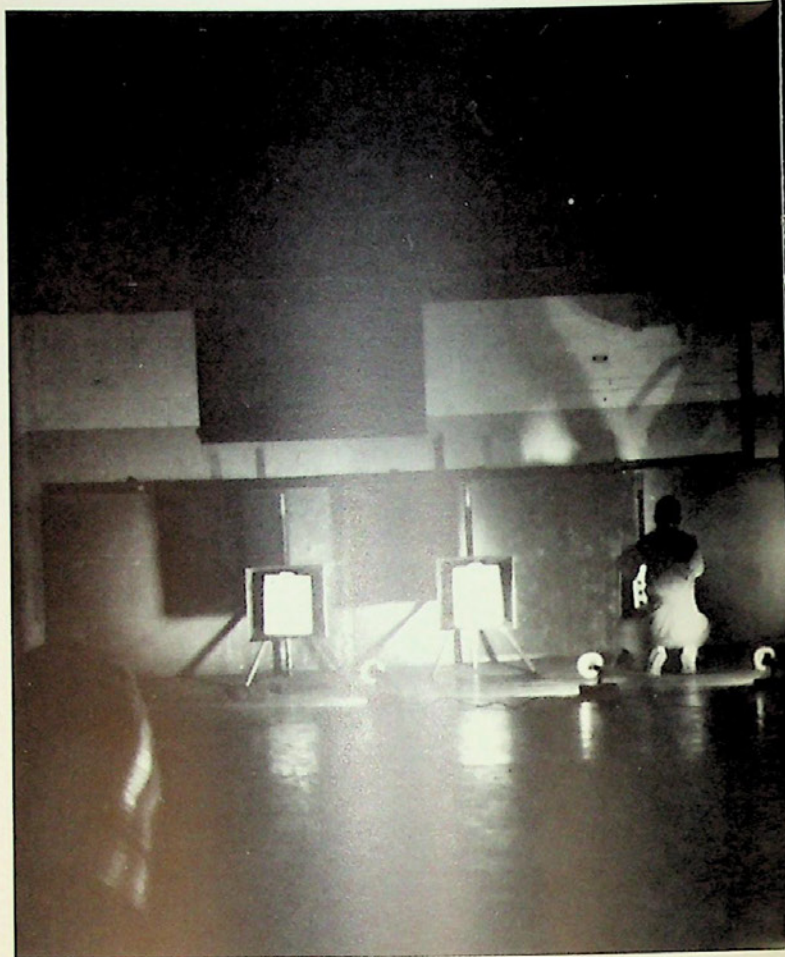
## Precise marksmen notch winning season

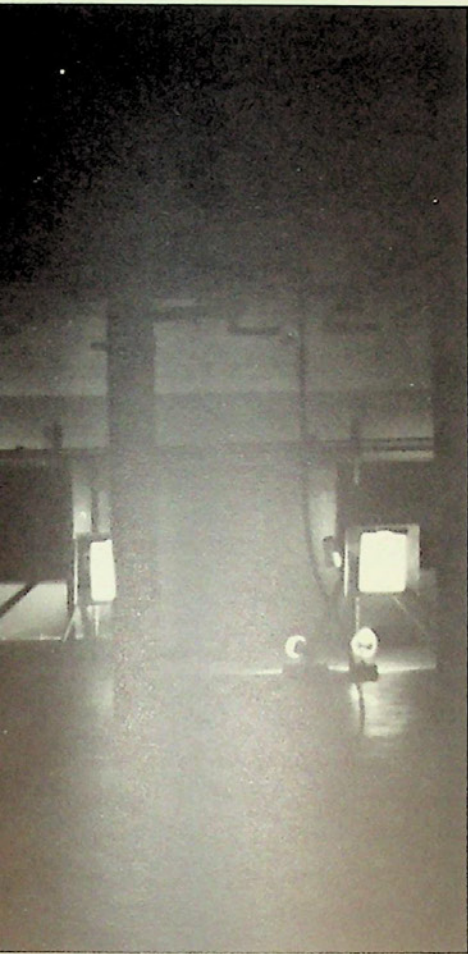

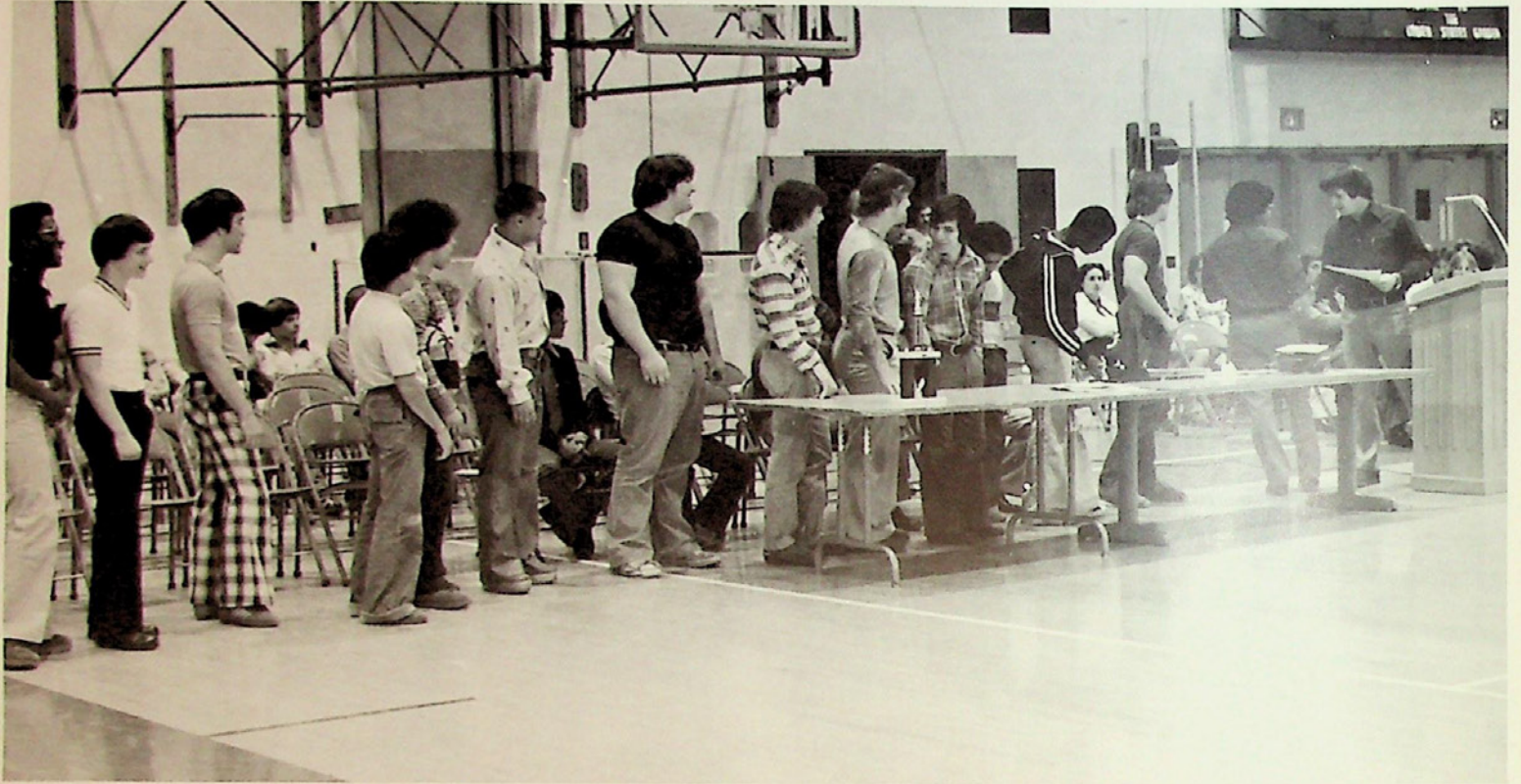

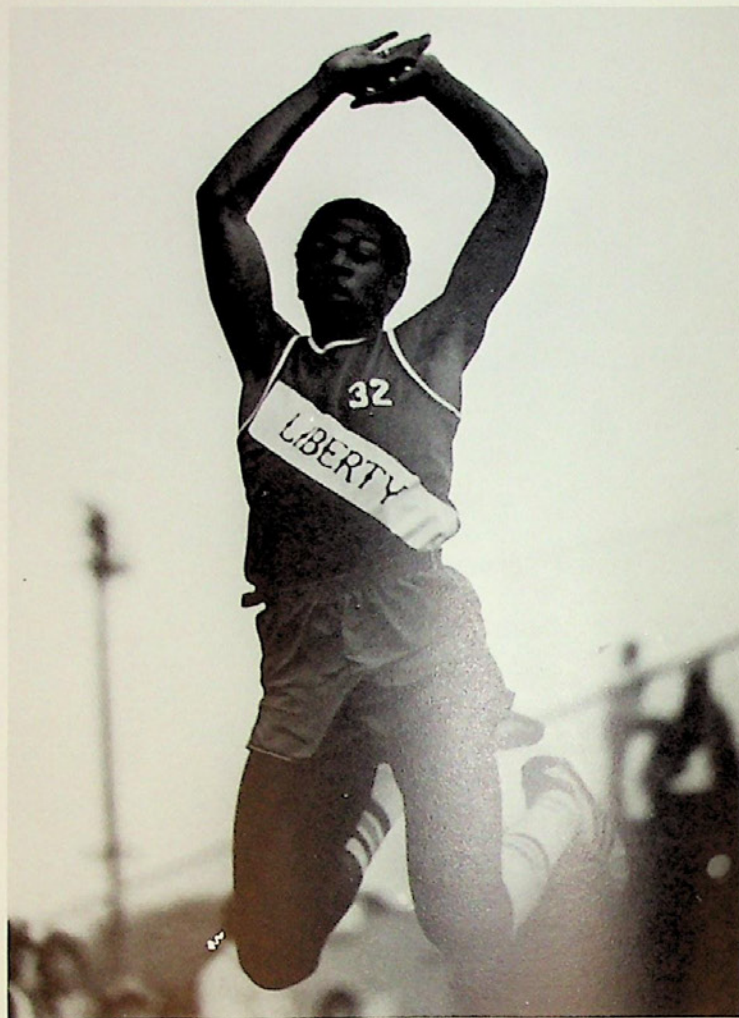
## Hatfield state champ; LHS trackmen tough as old records fall

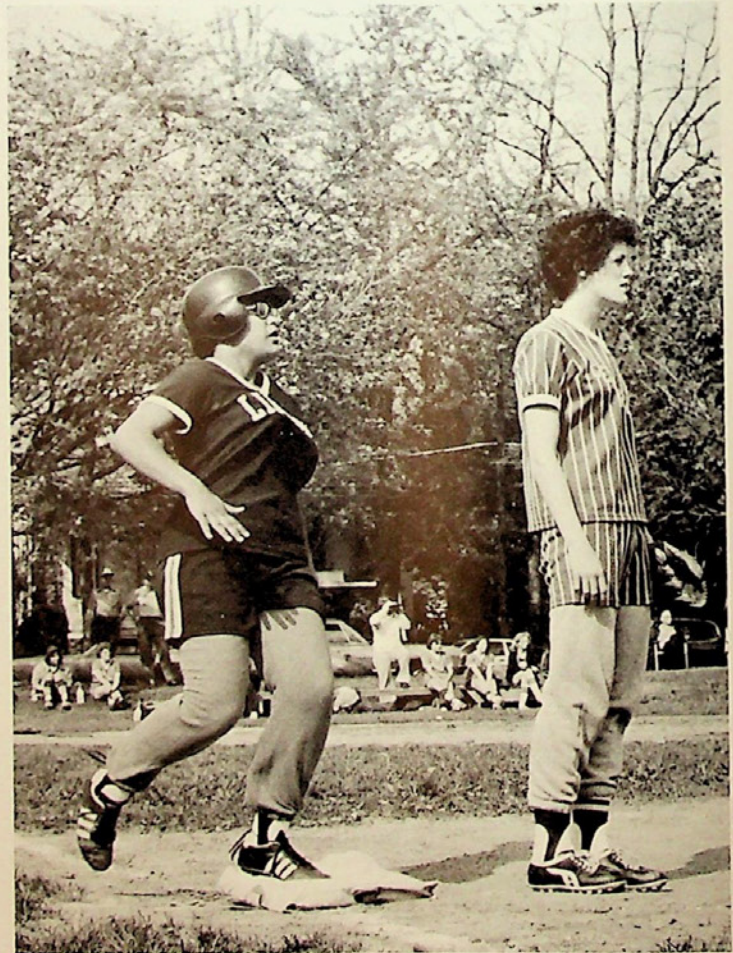

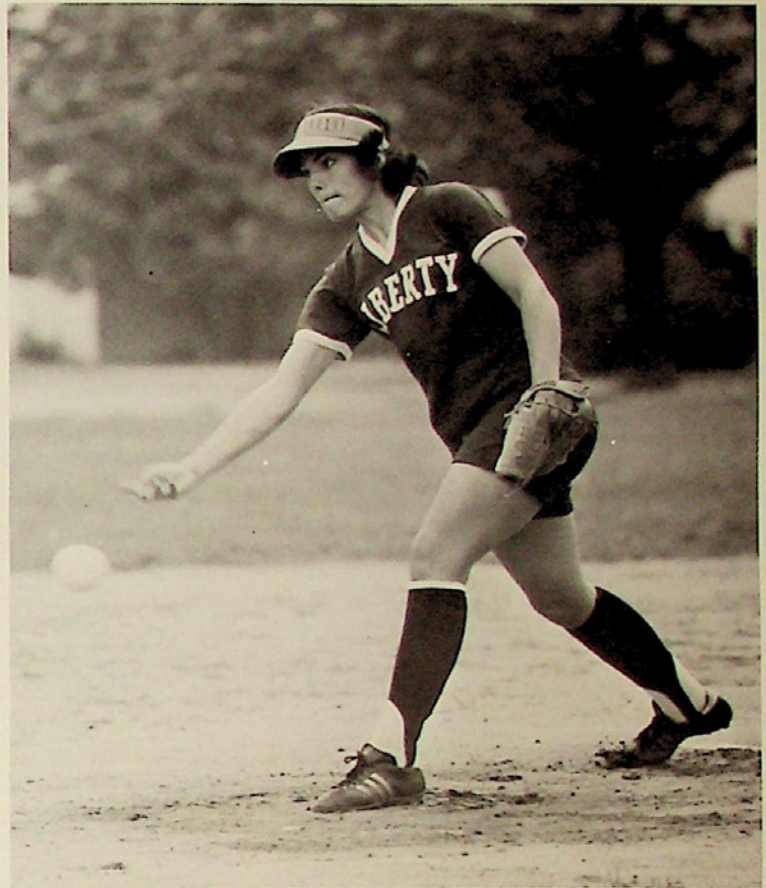

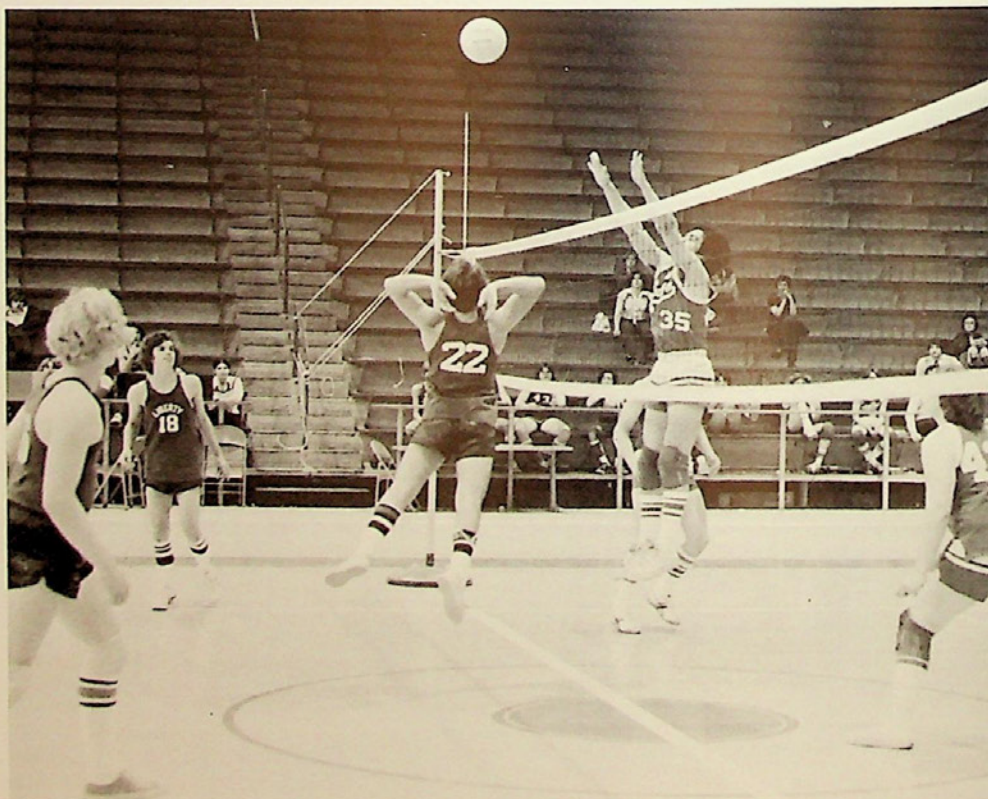

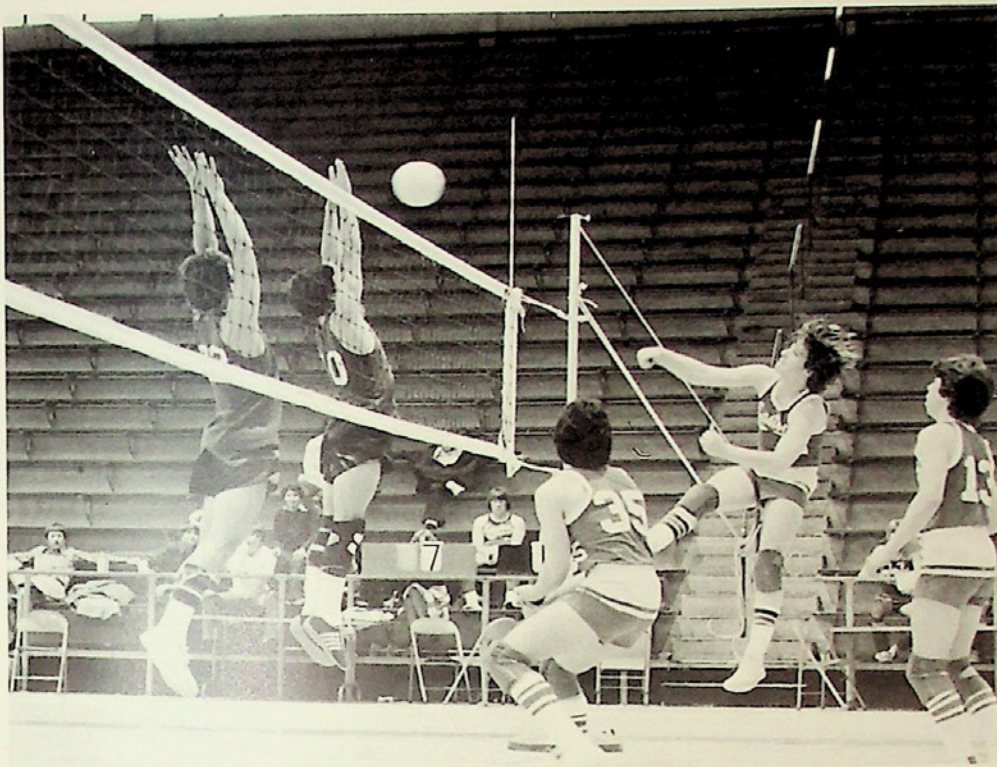
Danny returns a shot hit to the deep corner.

All eyes are on the ball as both teams set up for the next play.

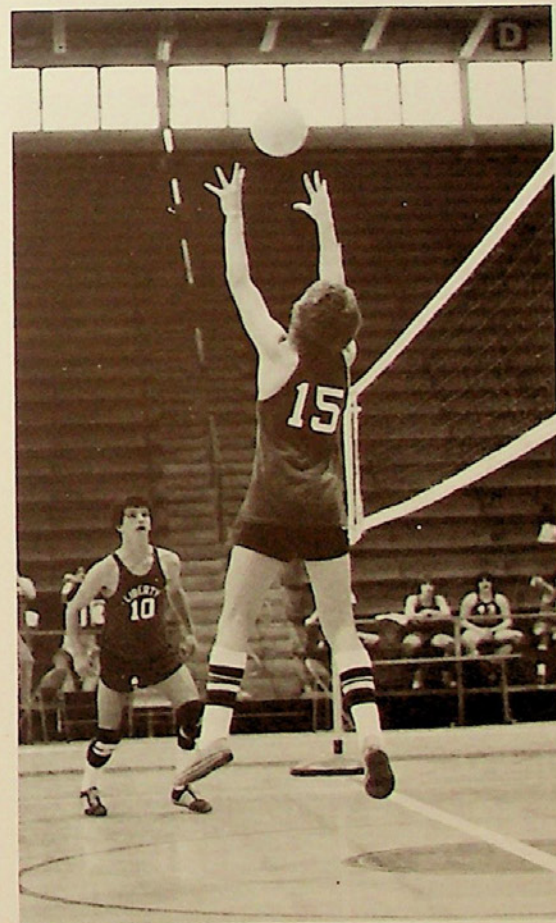

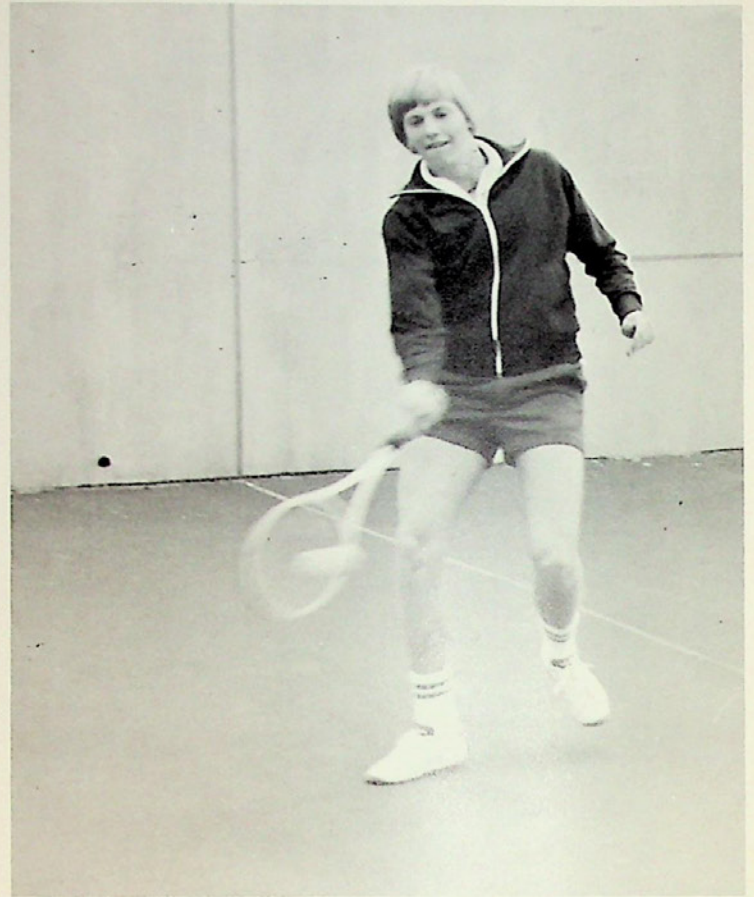

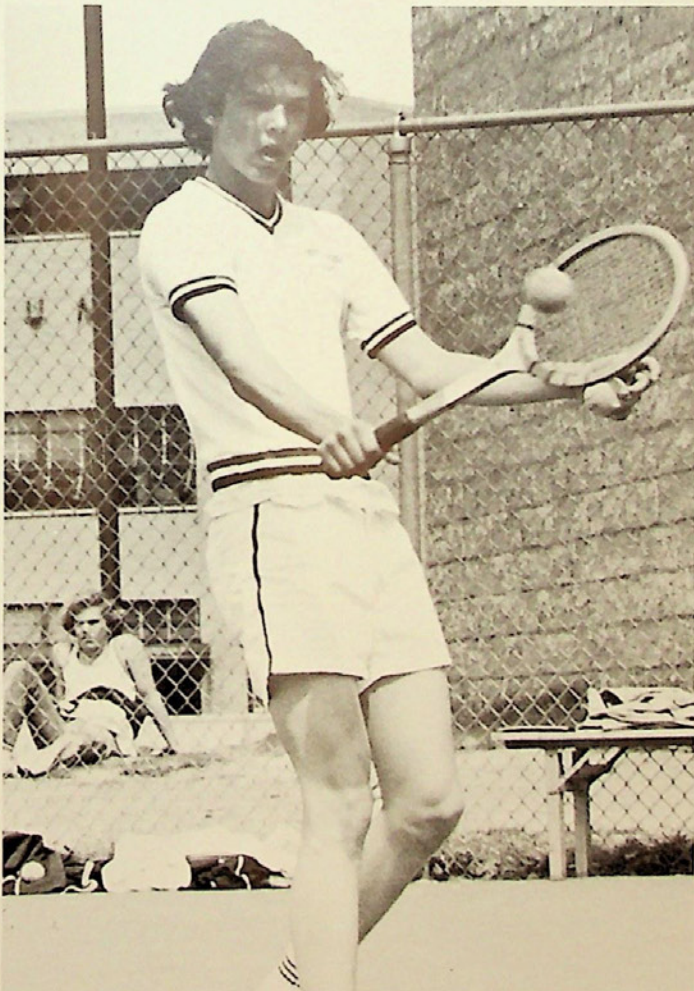

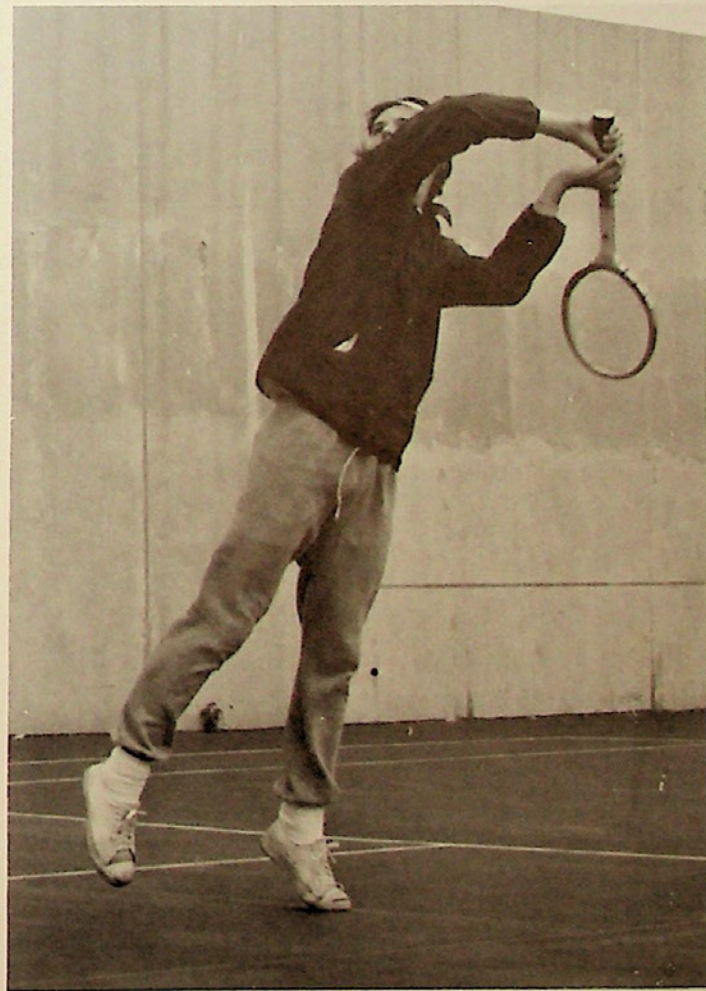


Senior Eric Pacala exhibits his backhand against Northampton.

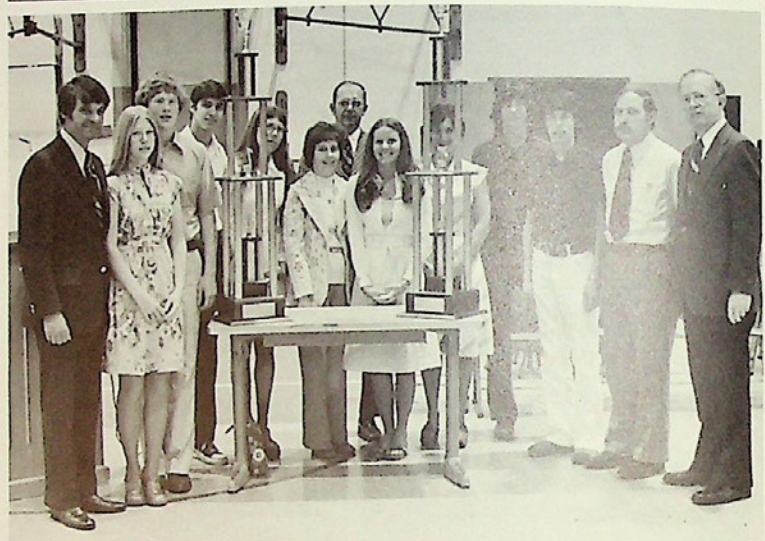

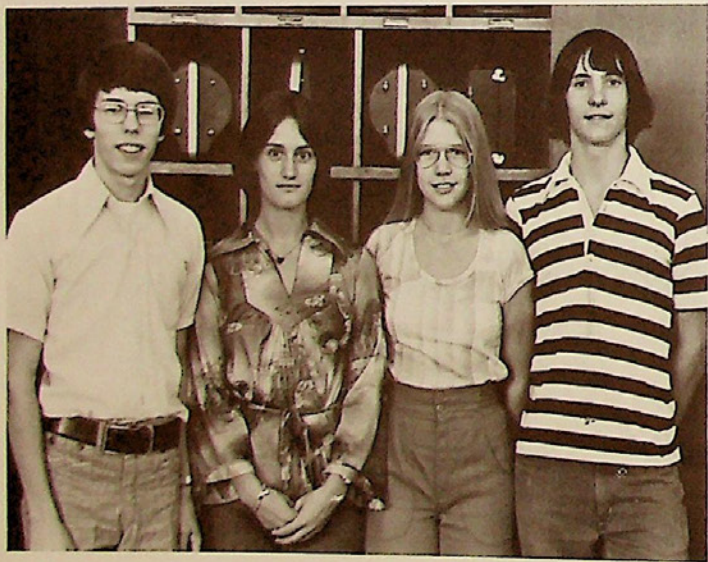
# Grenadiers win honors in Tennessee festival

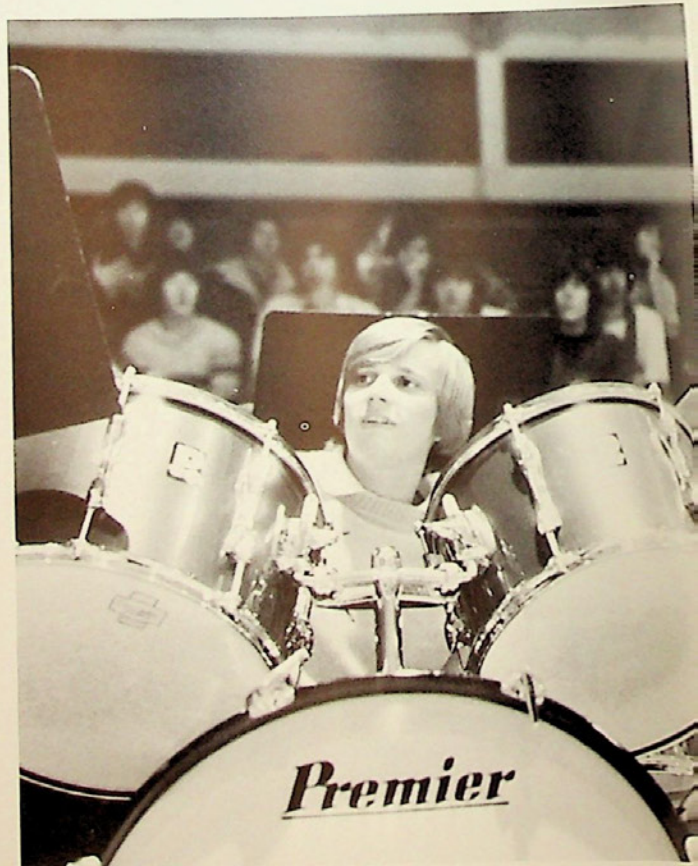

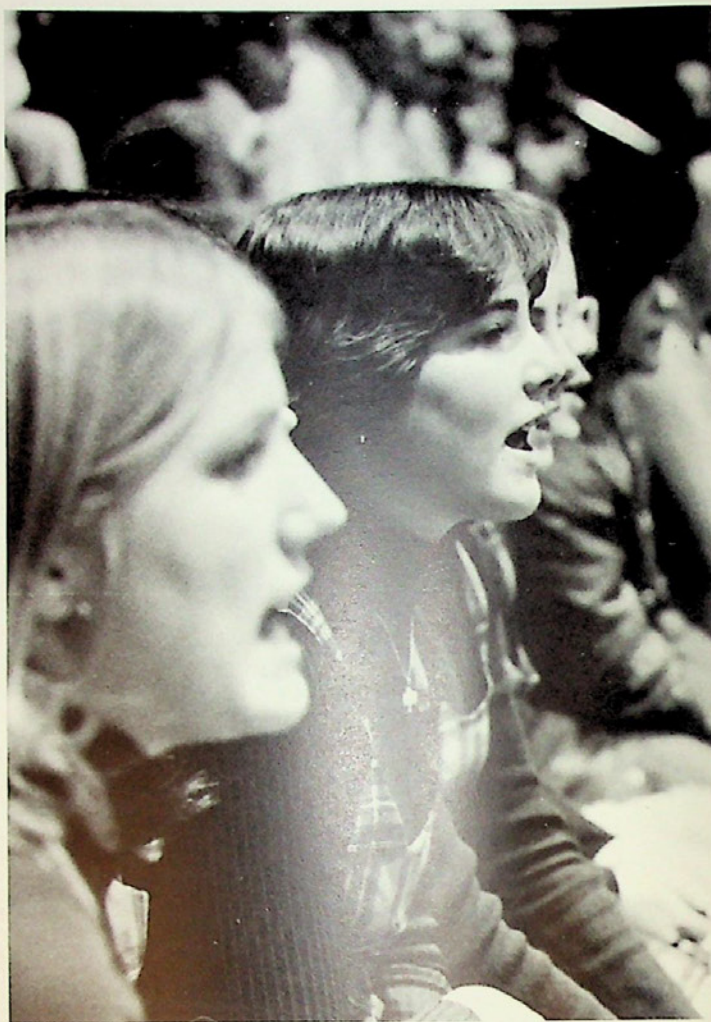

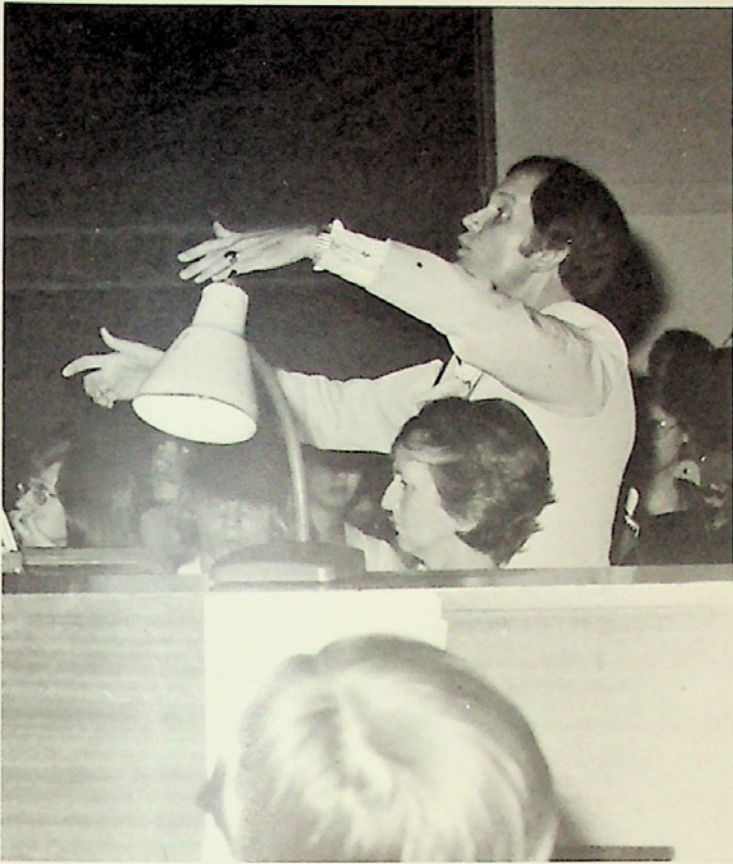

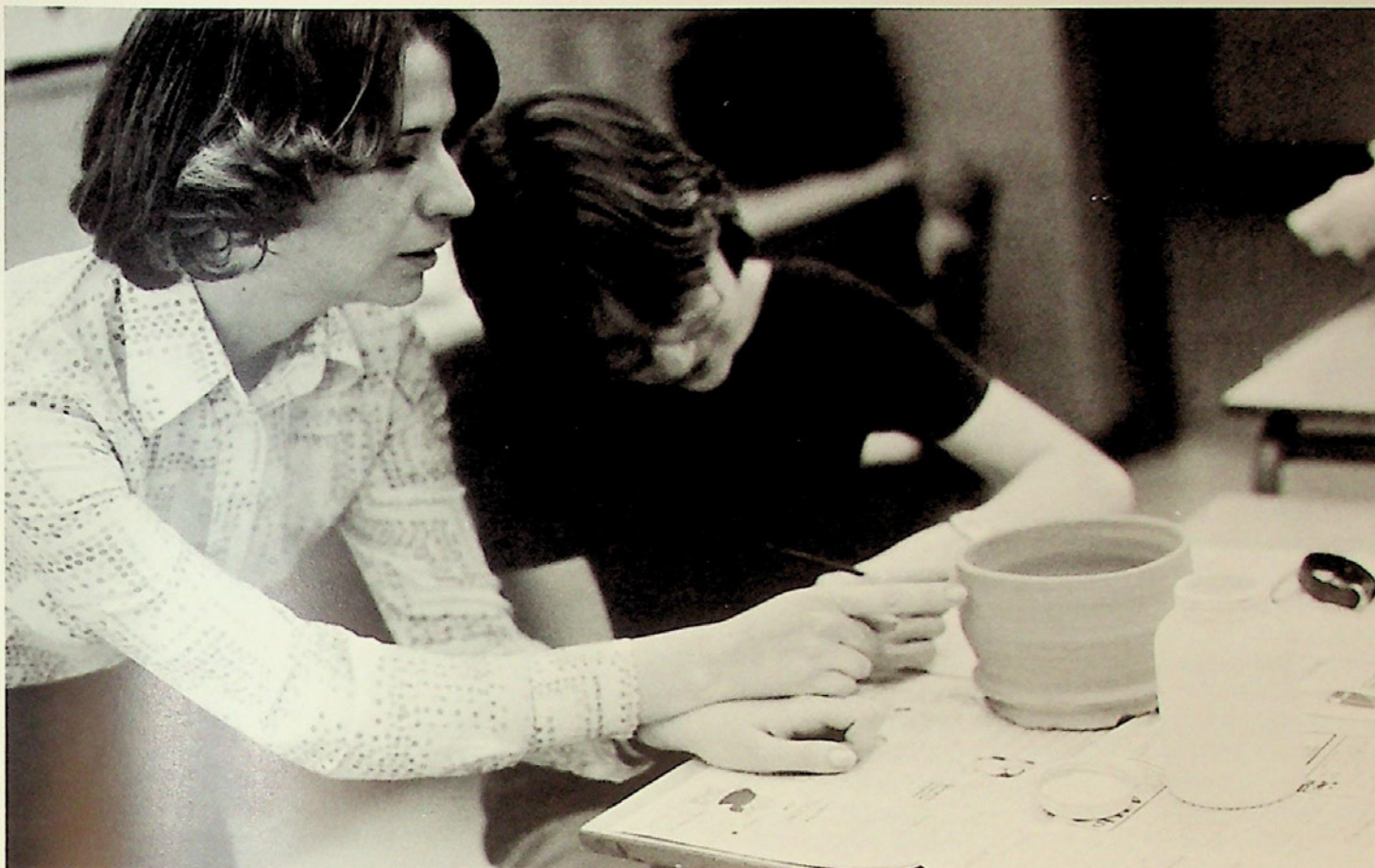

## Liberty welcomes exchange students

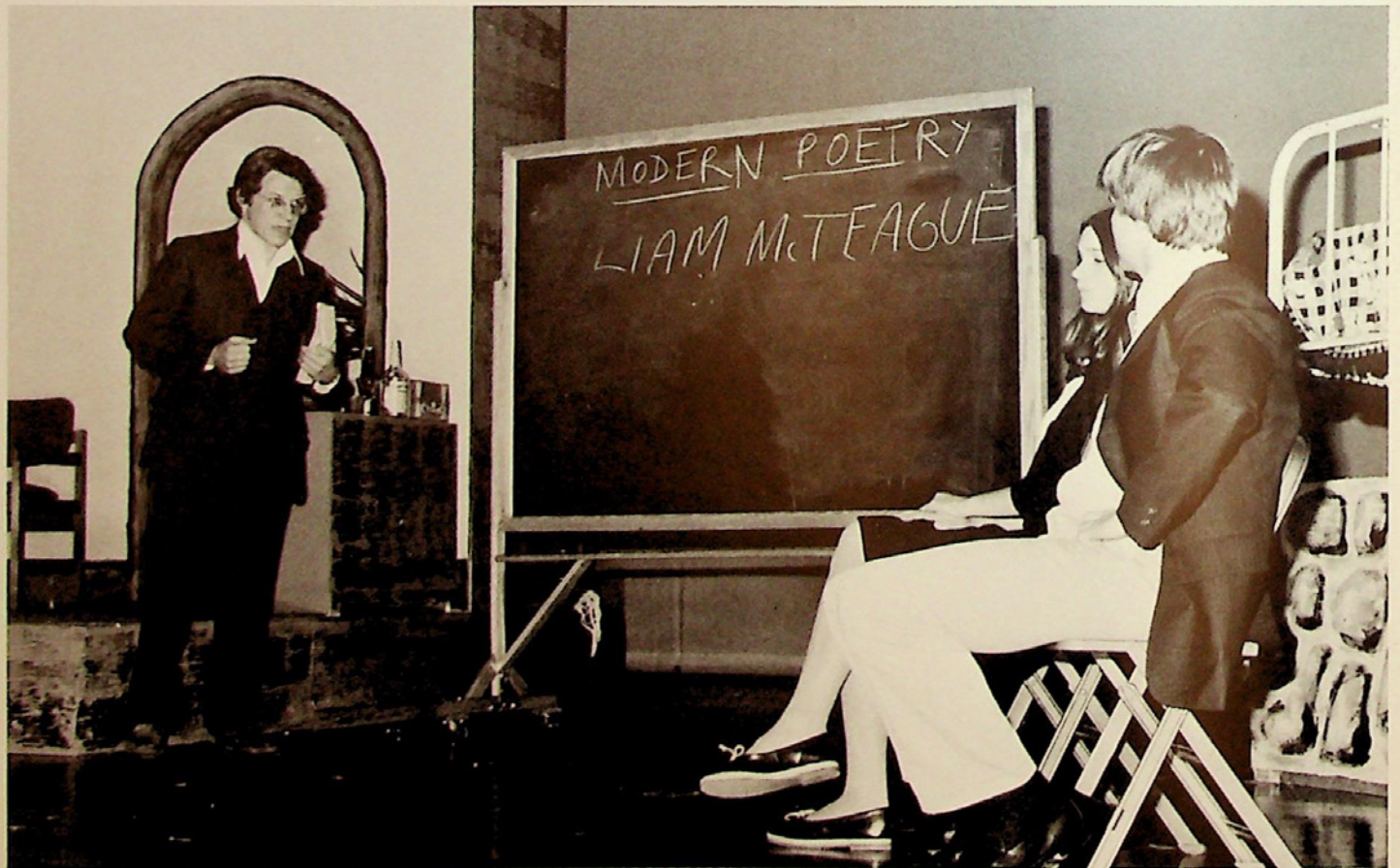

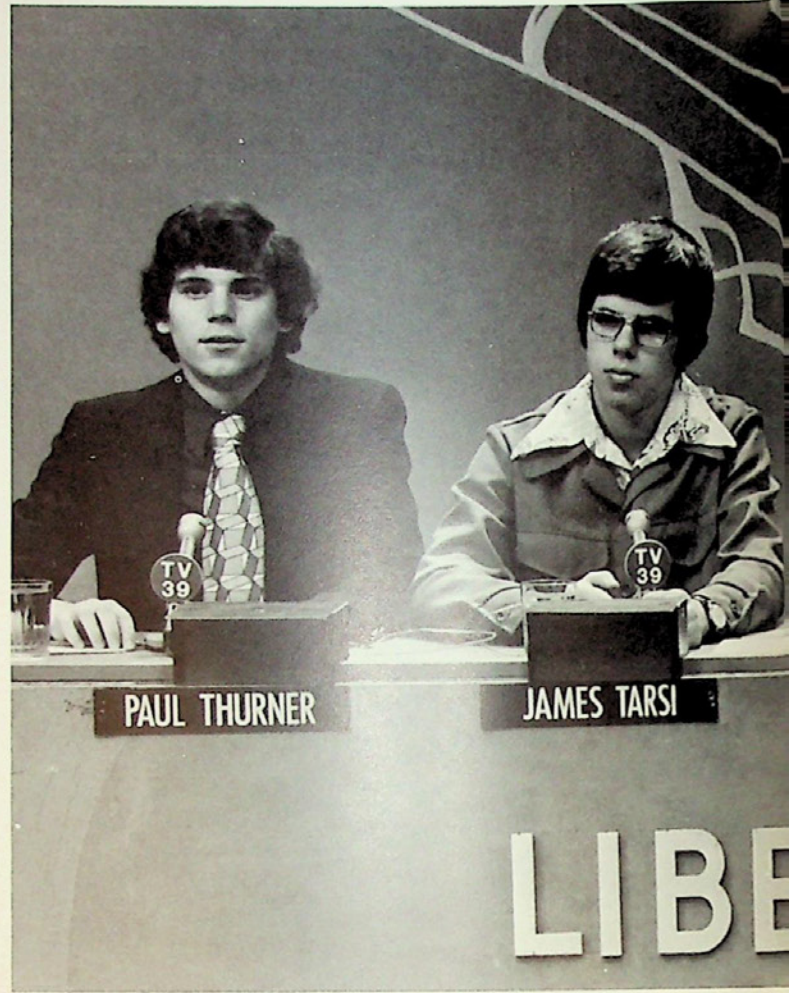

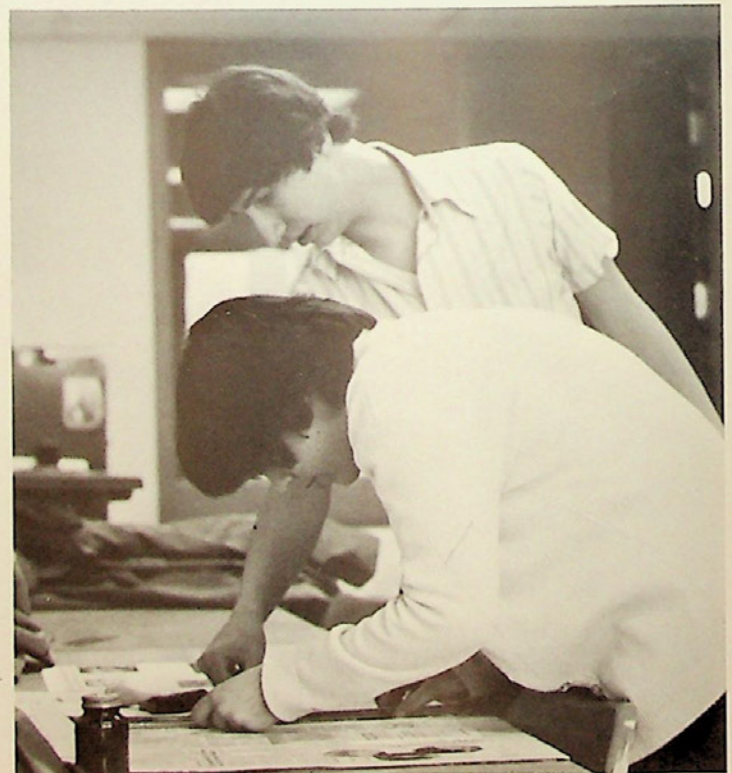

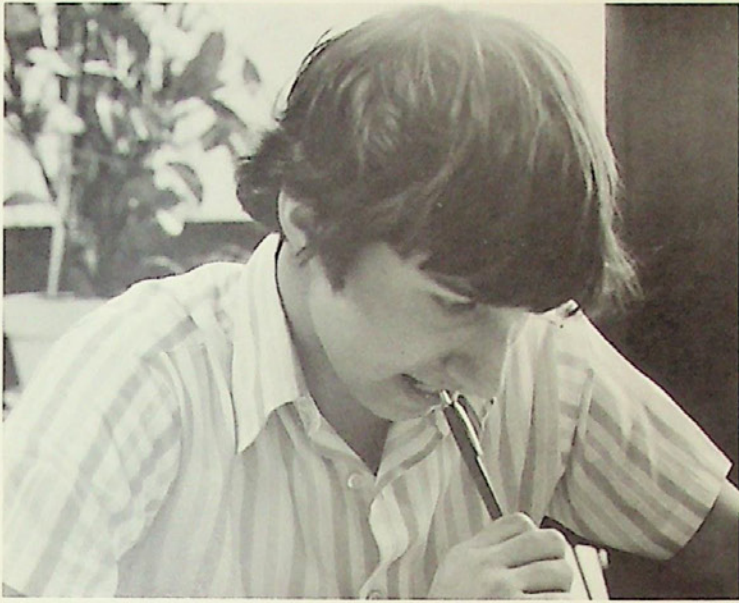


Dave Tallon casts a critical eye on a page layout.

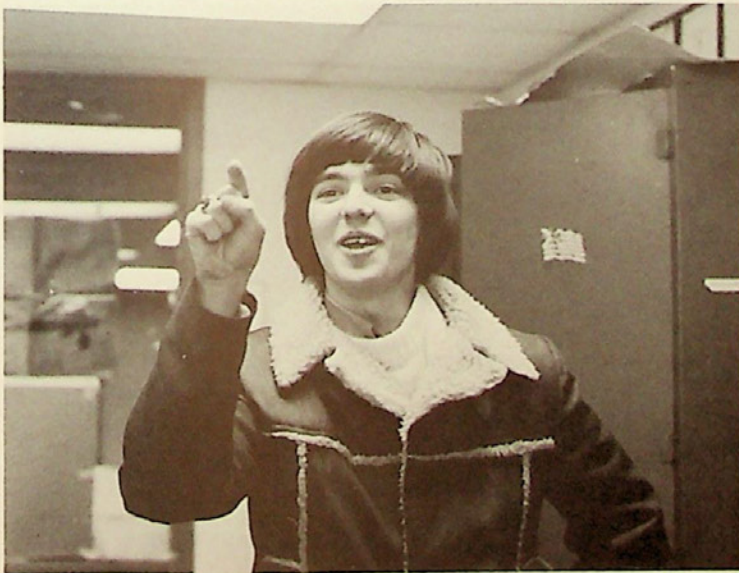

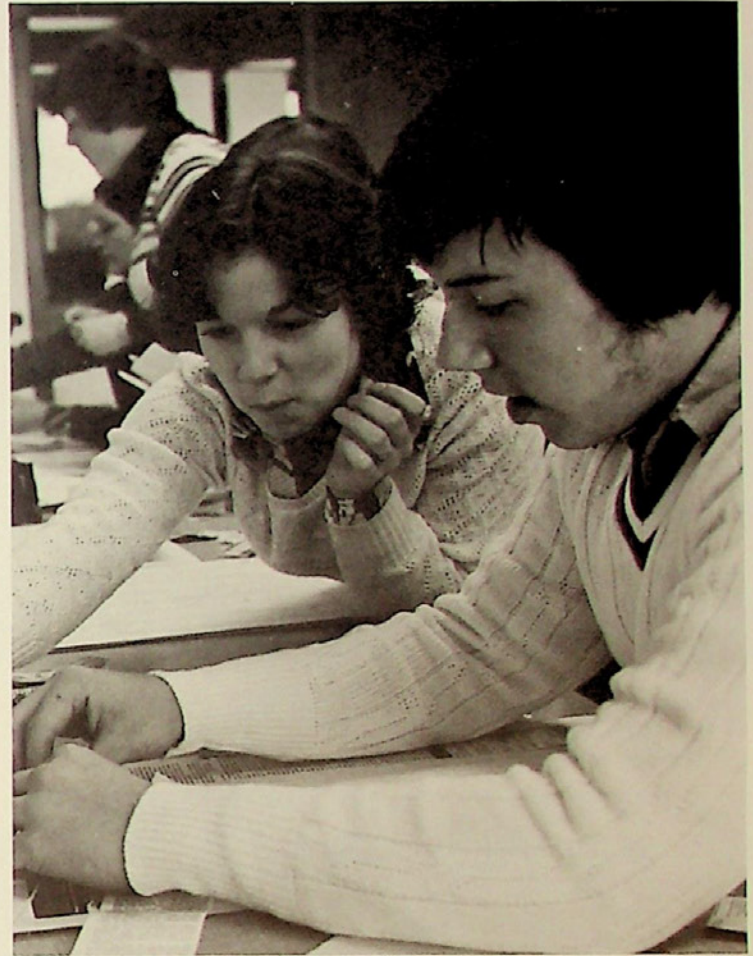

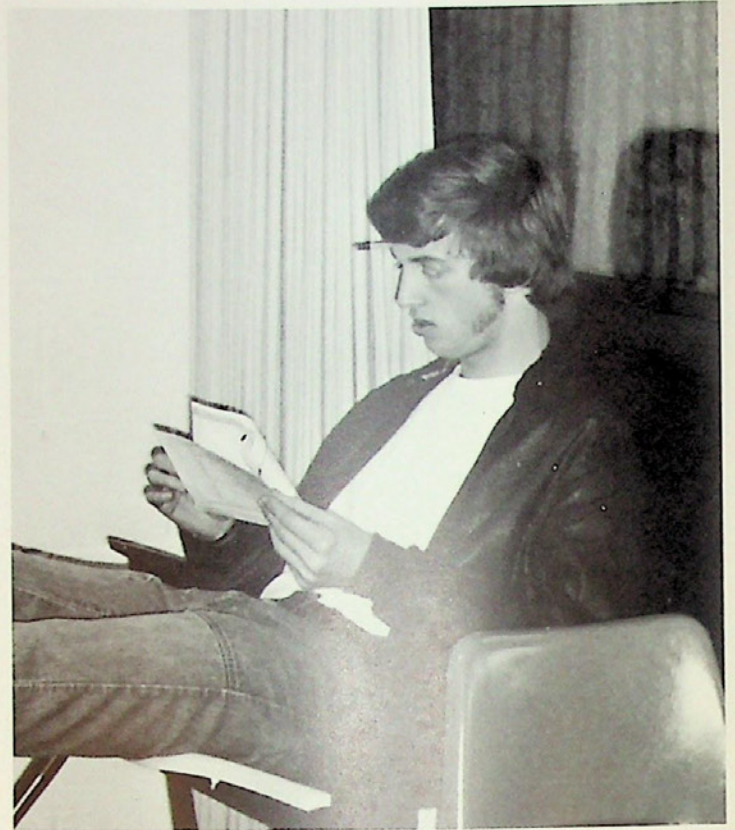

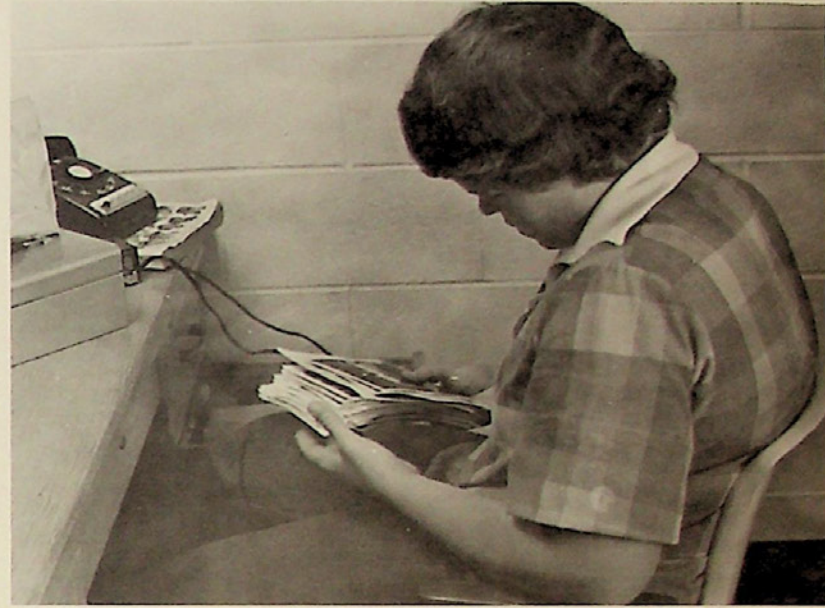

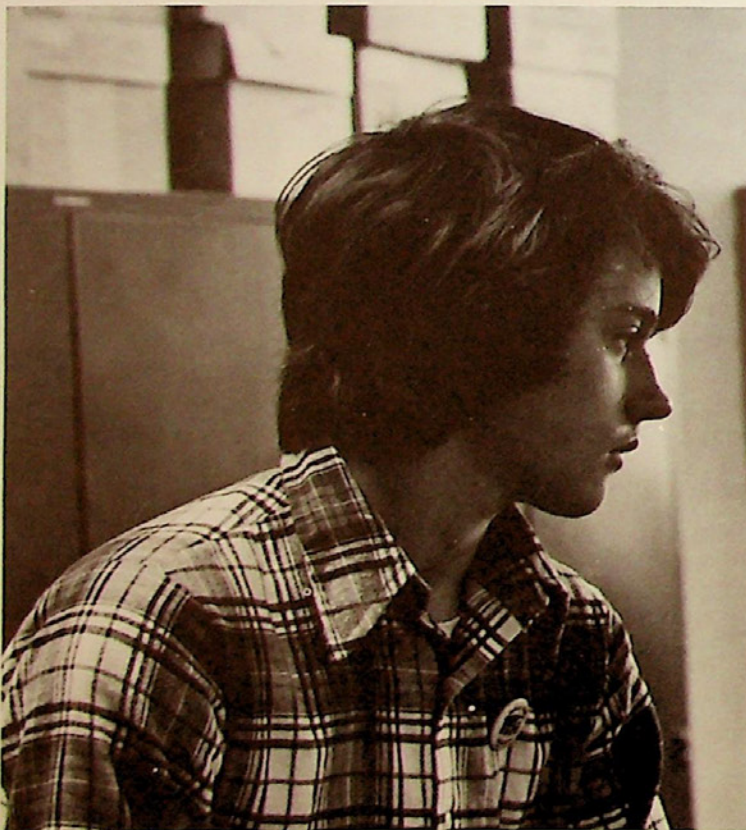
# Student Association surveys student body

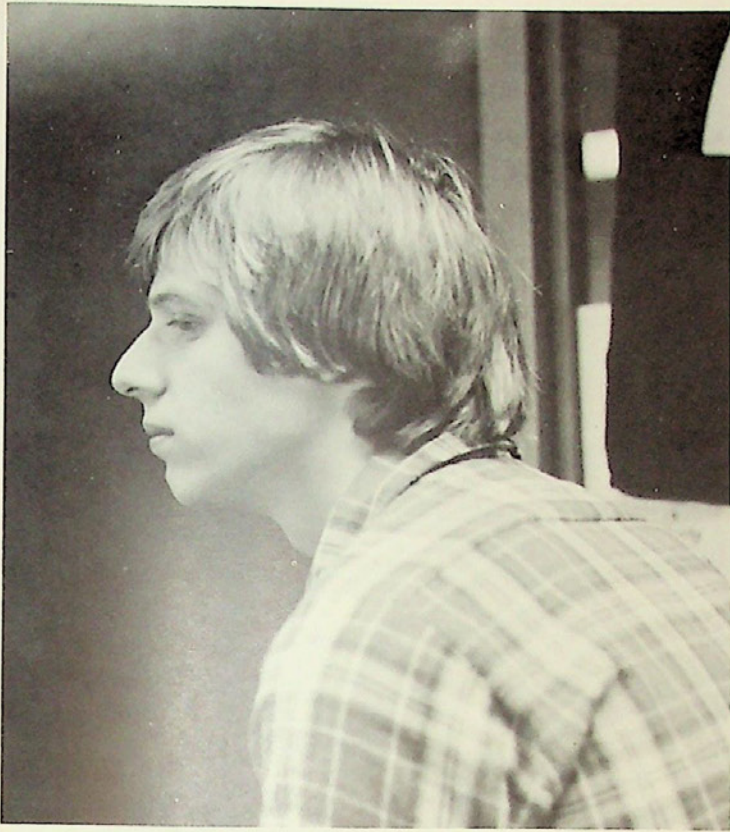

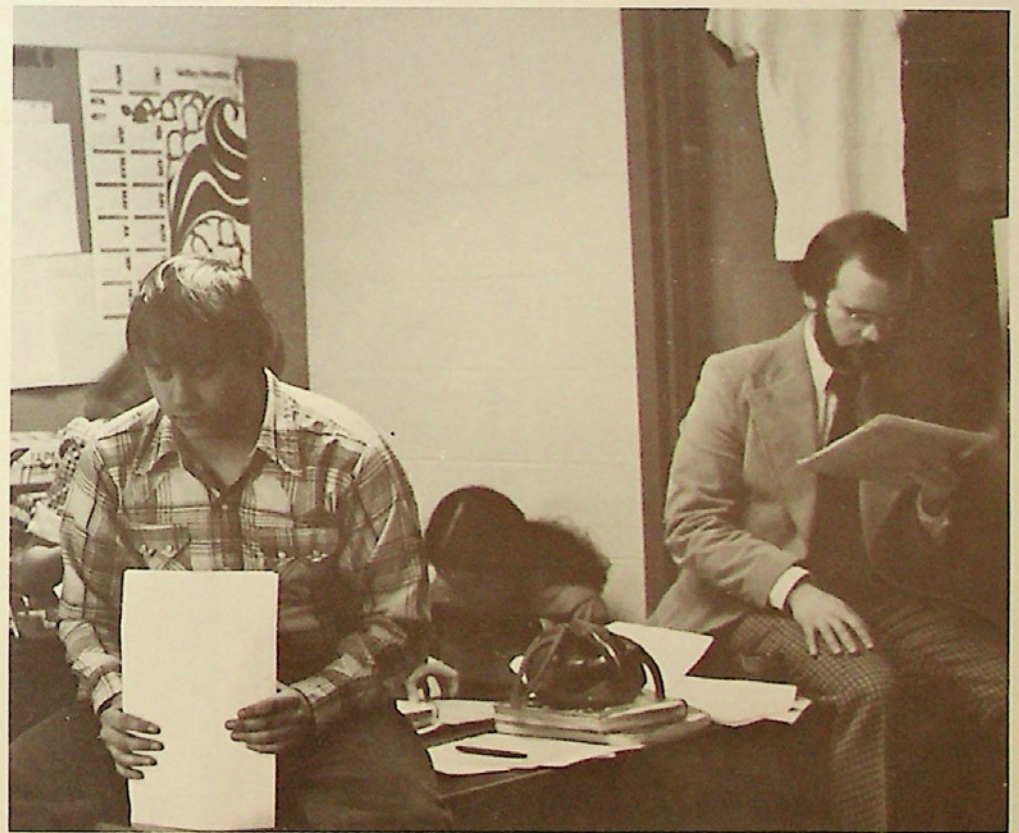

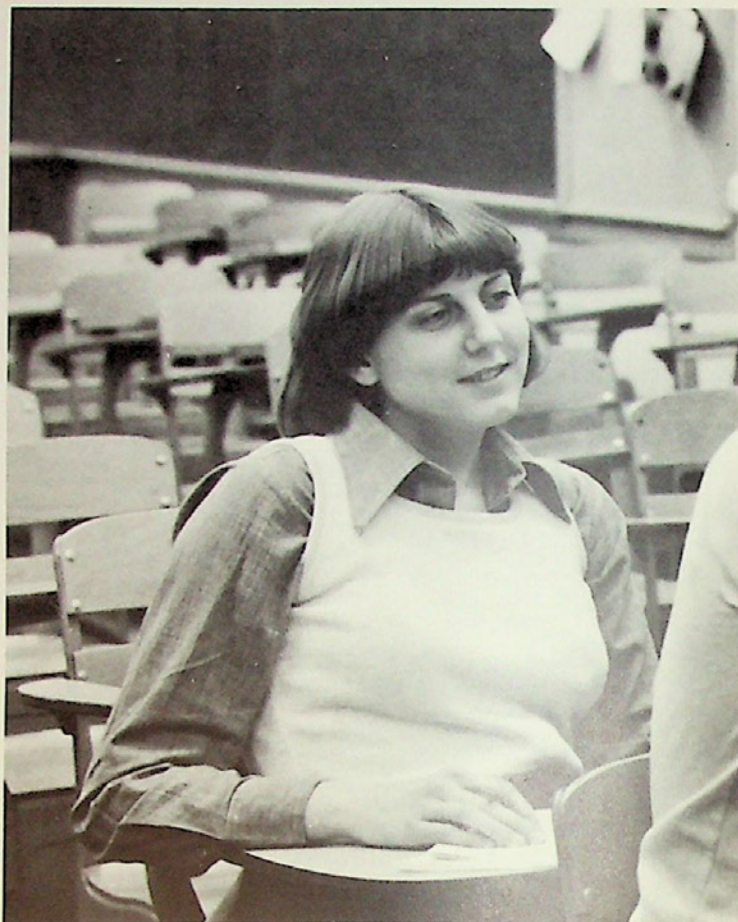
## Rule change allows girls in Key Club

The book room was under the supervision of Mr. John Clark, who assisted teachers by mimeographing papers and distributing stationery supplies and books.



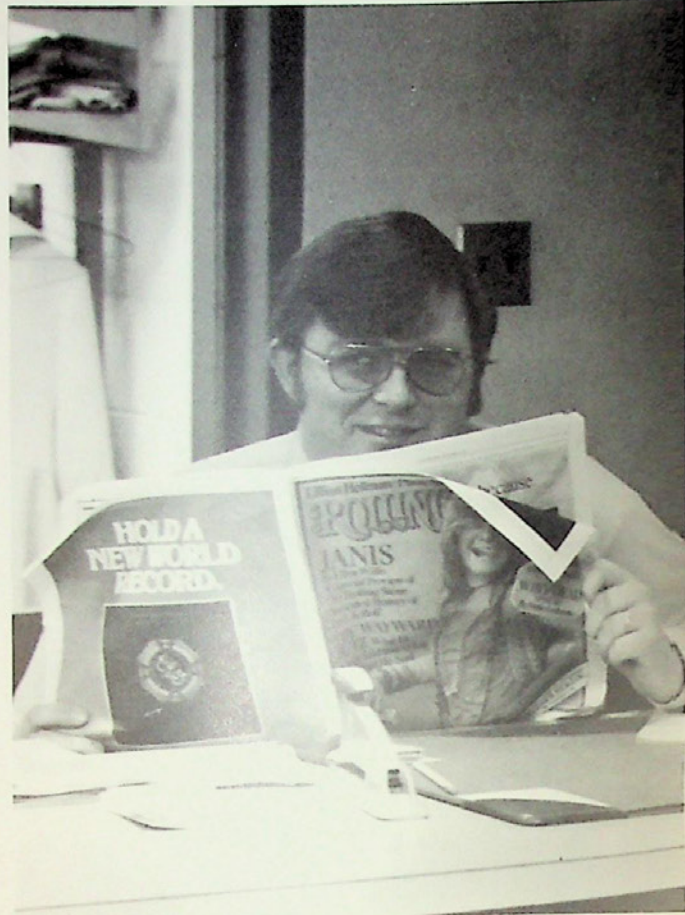
