

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SOUTHSIDE Charter Art's 'hole' note

Delay will not
change building
completion date

Months ago it was a thundering echo chamber that rattled windows and shuddered floors through nearby East Third Street buildings.

But today the giant hole that represents a literally unfulfilled future for the Lehigh Valley Charter HS for the Arts is a silent soggy pit.

But it's not a pit of despair, said Charter Arts Executive Director Dianne LaBelle in a phone interview Friday. The lack of movement in the \$26 million project is a result of one of the most severe winters in memory. She said the project broke ground a year ago and is still on schedule despite the delay. "It was a challenging winter. When we looked at the calendar at the end of February we had on 15 full days of school and it didn't stop until March."

LaBelle said that fol-

BASD Board passes budget

Includes 5 %
tax increase

The Bethlehem Area School District board passed the budget during the June 16 meeting with a 6-3 vote.

School directors Basilio Bonilla Jr. and Eugene McKeon both voted against the budget with Rogelio Ortiz. Bonilla and McKeon both made statements that their vote against the budget was not about naming lacrosse as a school sport.

"I just want to say that my vote was not a vote against the lacrosse program being added. I think lacrosse is a great program. My vote was against the budget because I can't approve a 5 percent [tax] increase on seniors at this time," said Bonilla.

The budget total for the 2014-15 school year is \$242.5 million.

In order to reach the budget, the district applied to the state to change some programs while cutting others.

"This was not an easy budget by any means. This was just to keep what we had, and even keeping what we had, we cut

SteelStacks scores with soccer gathering

Hogan was part of a crowd of thousands who showed up for the USA-Portugal soccer match at the World Cup SoccerFest and Viewing Party at SteelStacks in Bethlehem. The event featured numerous giant screen televisions along with food and refreshments.

Sunday's event brought many people, both long-time and new fans, from all over the area together to celebrate their love of soccer.

The majority of the crowd sported red, white and blue in support of the U.S. team, exhibiting con-

fidence and their optimism for the result of the game.

"I believe that they have a chance to win, I really do," Jared Troxell of Allentown said. "Why come if you don't believe?"

Other spectators, such as Dan Cudzil of Schnecksville, said they didn't make predictions but instead hoped for the best and rooted on the team.

While the number of US supporters outnumbered those of their opponents, the Portugal fans also made their presence known.

"I've been watching soccer since I was a little kid," said Stephanie Forres of Allentown. "I think Portugal's chances of winning today are good. Going all the way, not so

"much." Appreciation was expressed for the gathering place and atmosphere SteelStacks provided.

"I think this is great. This is way better than sitting at home," Forbes said. "I think it's nice when people can come together like this even when I'm rooting against them."

Hogan remarked that the atmosphere created by the fans was fabulous and that the attention brought to SteelStacks is wonderful for the area. Troxell agreed, saying being able to share in the

spectators' patriotism was a great experience.

Although this kind of support for soccer in the United States was unexpected by many, the spectators were happy to come together and share in the excitement with fellow fans.

"I think it's great," Troxell said. "I'm really glad they're holding this in Bethlehem."

Mark Demko, the spokesperson for Arts Quest, the nonprofit arts organization serving as the host for the SoccerFest and Viewing Party at SteelStacks, said the turnout for the games has been overwhelming.

"The support from the

community for the FIFA World Cup SoccerFest and Viewing Party has been simply amazing," Demko said. "Over the past 11 days the crowds have continued to build, with more than 10,000 people coming out last night to cheer on the USA during its big match against Portugal."

"The World Cup is the most popular sporting event in the world, and we've definitely seen that in recent days, with so many people coming out to support their favorite teams. Overall, more than 35,000 people have attended the festival since it started, enjoying not only the games on the giant outdoor screen on Steel-

Stacks Air Products Town Square, but also the free soccer clinics, hands-on soccer activities and free family fun."

Demko added that he expects the excitement and the crowds to grow as the tournament continues.

"We thank all of the programming partners, sponsors, volunteers and fans who have come together to make this event so successful," he said. "We're looking forward to showing all the rest of the World Cup action including Thursday's huge game with Germany on SteelStacks' other two outdoor screens."

millions," said Board President Michael Facinetto.

Facinetto and BASD Superintendent Dr. Joseph Roy also wrote a letter explaining some of the expenses the board has while creating a budget and that some of the big-

ger expenses that drove up the budget for the upcoming school year are out of the district's control. The letter will be mailed with residents' tax bills.

In the letter, Facinetto and Roy talk about the effects of having to pay for charter schools and increasing pension costs.

They said that without the state mandate to pay charter school tuition, there would be no increase in BASD property taxes this year.

In other news, the board heard an update on the Nitschmann MS project and went over a resolution urging the state general assembly to establish

a new funding formula for basic education. The board personalized the resolution by including some information about the district. Roy also went over changes he would like to make to the IT department to update it and help it better serve the district's technology needs.

lowing the numerous record snows a soil test in April necessitated a redesign of the foundation. The pre-cast concrete that will be used for effective sound transmission, a requirement for the constant music practices and frequent performances foreseen, will make for a heavy build-

ing.

LaBelle said construction should recommence later this month. Sections of the building will likely be available for performances by this time next year and the new school will be ready for the 2015 school year.

The new 87,000-square-foot building was designed by Southside group Artefact, Inc. and built by Bethlehem-based Bucks Development. It will provide

educational space for 650 students and will include a 350-seat theater, a 200-seat performance hall, a

rooftop venue, art galleries, laboratories, a library and recording studio.

Students from schools around the Lehigh Valley received recognition for acts of kindness done when they had no expectation of getting a reward or even a "thank you."


The awards, given by Travelers Protective Association Post Lehigh Valley this spring, included certificates of achievement and cash scholarships for recipients.

Students with challenges and disabilities throughout the area were the real winners, as student body presidents, cheerleaders, and other students lead efforts to help them.

One such action by Salisbury HS's Samantha Heiserman was shared by Salisbury's Mike Anderson, who spoke to the roomful of students, parents and school representatives following the meal they had all just shared.

He described how Heiserman had welcomed a group of Intermediate Unit students with "multiple challenges and disabilities" by taking the group to the "Welcome Back Pep Rally" held by the high school.

"What resulted,"

Anderson said, "was something no one anticipated. Other students began approaching me wanting to get involved with the IU class. Before long the Best Buddies Program was formed."

Another student, Evan Anthony of Freedom HS, led fellow students in efforts that raised more than \$50,000 for the Four Diamonds Foundation's fight against pediatric cancer.

"It is not often that you come across such a natural born leader," said English teacher George

Ziegler when introducing Student Body President Evan Anthony.

Another student, Olivia Macdonald was introduced by Parkland HS representative Jennifer Tabarani.

"As the Peers Assisting Learning Support Club (PALS) president, Olivia played a vital role in rallying a large high school to promote the acceptance of all students with and without disabilities," Tabarani said.

As keynote speaker, Judge Paula Roscioli observed, "The award

recipients gathered here this evening are by no means typical teens. You are outstanding young men and women, and it is a privilege to be here tonight to honor you and your accomplishments."

Roscioli contrasted the honorees with a young girl she had seen in a mall wearing a T-shirt emblazoned, "It's All About Me."

Roscioli said the act of altruism is like being the philanthropist who donates a large sum of money anonymously without expecting his name to appear on a building.

"Nothing would make me more proud than to have a child of mine awarded for the selfless concern for the wellbeing of others," said Roscioli, a judge of the Court of Common Pleas of Northampton County.

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Morganelli supports amnesty for drug OD whistleblowers

District Attorney John Morganelli has joined the bipartisan chorus supporting changes in state law that will guarantee immunity to minor drug offenders who report drug overdoses to emergency responders. At a June 16 news conference, he referred to legislation currently being considered by State Senate majority leader Dominic Pileggi. A similar proposal unanimously passed the State House in May. "Saving lives should take precedence over prosecuting minor drug cases," said

Morganelli.

A recent study by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention warns that drug overdose deaths have doubled between 1999 and 2010. Many of these are from prescription painkillers, which have killed more than 15,500 people in the United States since 2009. In addition to the fatalities, emergency department visits for prescription painkiller abuse have doubled in the past five years to nearly half a million.

In Northampton County, the problem is acute. According to the Penn-

sylvania State Coroners Association, 149 people died in Northampton County from drug overdoses between 2009 and 2013. By contrast, in Lehigh County, there were only 40 deaths. In Monroe County, there were only 32 deaths. Northampton County has more colleges than Lehigh or Monroe counties.

Morganelli calls the proposal, which still allows the prosecution of drug dealers and drug-induced homicides, "reasonable legislation to encourage individuals who are aware that some-

one is in harm's way as a result of a drug overdose to contact 911 without fear that the good deed could land them in jail." According to the National Conference of State Legislatures, 34 states have introduced bills this year to minimize the number of drug-overdose deaths. Morganelli added that 19 states already have some form of amnesty.

In Pennsylvania, Gov. Tom Corbett signed legislation in 2011 that provides legal amnesty to underage drinkers who call emergency authorities to help a friend with an emergency, alcohol-related, illness.

Planning director answers top questions

Lehigh Valley Planning Commission Executive Director Becky Bradley has been on the job for nearly a year. On June 19, she provided Northampton County with an informative presentation about recent subdivision and building activity. But she also came armed with her top ten list of ques-

1. Is the Lehigh Valley Really Growing? - Yes, at the rate of about one percent each year. By 2040, there will be 873,000 people in the Lehigh Valley.

2. How old are we? - Pretty old. The largest segment of the population consists of people

age 65 or older. But the next largest group, interestingly, is those under 20.

3. Are we diverse? - We're getting there. White people still make up 82 percent of the population. The next largest ethnic group is the Hispanic community.

4. Where are people working? - The jobs are in

the health care and social assistance sectors. That makes sense because the two largest population groups are the very old and very young.

5. Do we have a lot of commuters? - Yes. According to Bradley, 186,499 people live and work in the Lehigh Valley. But another 103,667 leave every day for jobs outside the area. The

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Cover-up or Confess?

There are two ways of dealing with sin that are totally contrary to each other. The prideful human way attempts to **cover-up** sin as if it never happened. It blocks God's mercy and prevents spiritual progress. On the other hand, the divine and humble way to deal with sin is to **confess it**. **Honest confession** opens God's mercy door to forgiveness as the Bible declares in Proverbs 28:13, "**He that covereth his sins shall not prosper; but whose confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy.**" This truth is emphasized also in 1 John 1:8-9, "**If we say that we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us. If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness.**"

After King David's sin of adultery with Bathsheba, he planned a **cover-up** when she told him she was with child. He sent for her husband to bring him a military report and then told him to enjoy the comforts of his home and wife. But Uriah was such a faithful soldier that he refused to go home while others were on the battlefield. So, David's **cover-up** plot thickened. He sent instructions to his captain to put Uriah in the front of the battle to cause his death. Then David took Bathsheba for his wife, but God sent the prophet, Nathan, who blew the lid off of his **cover-up** saying, "**For thou didst it secretly.**" David confessed and repented. "**I have sinned against the LORD**" (2 Samuel 12:12-13). He prayed, "**I acknowledged my sin unto thee...I said, I will confess my transgressions unto the LORD; and thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin**" (Psalm 32:5).

Yes, **honest confession** is the way to forgiveness. When you **confess** your sin, God will **cover your sin by the blood of His Son**. You will rejoice with David, "**Blessed is he whose transgression is forgiven, whose sin is covered**" (Psalm 32:1) and sing, "**Mine iniquities so vast, Have been blotted out at last, My sins are all covered by the blood.**"

Local teams near top



It was the most picturesque landscape anyone can ask for to watch a sporting event Sunday night, as the USA took on Portugal in the World Cup.

It's a wave of support that has been growing over the last decade that I fully realized on Sunday night. There were so many American flags on the beaches in Rio, you would have thought it was the Fourth of July at the Jersey Shore.

These games have always meant more to me than just soccer. They've been an opportunity to celebrate being an American, which is something this country struggles with more than any other land on the planet.

As thousands of people gathered at Bethlehem's SteelStacks to watch the USA play while I was gone, it's fair to assume that was part of their motivation too.

As I return from another long flight in a distant country this week, I hope that this American dream keeps marching on when we take on Germany Thursday afternoon. It's just too much fun to not have the Yanks keep playing, as we all celebrate being countrymen together.

But if there's anything these World Cups should teach anyone, it's too not be afraid of the world around you. I scared myself into thinking I would get robbed at gunpoint in Brazil because of what I read in the media.

Instead, the only thing that was taken from me was a nightcap of fun because of a nightmarish Portuguese goal. It's a big world out there and you don't have much time to enjoy all of it.

I'm glad I've rolled the dice in life to create memories that will never go away.

Go USA.

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



Say anything

TeenCentral.Net provides resources for youths to navigate rough times

"We want to reach kids before they need our services."

These are the words of Dr. Julius Licata, co-founder and director of the website, TeenCentral.Net, created by KidsPeace, the nonprofit residential mental health treatment center for children and teens based in Ore-field, North Whitehall, with its KidsPeace Broadway Campus in Salisbury Township.

Licata explains that TeenCentral offers free and anonymous on-line mental health counseling and crisis intervention for youths in need, youths who are facing mental health issues, bullying, peer pressure and more.

"KidsPeace does a great job of providing help to kids in crisis," he says, "but we felt like what we were missing was preventative measures."

"We wanted to reach kids

before the crisis hit. When a child gets to the point where they take their own life, it's too late. We were missing out on the crucial intervention and prevention stage, and that's why we created TeenCentral."

At TeenCentral, youths can receive advice from volunteer counselors and master clinicians within 24 hours of posting a personal story or question.

"They can ask anything, say anything," says Licata. "Everything is free, and they can go on as often as they like, whenever they like and everything they say is protected."

Licata says that when a major national crisis has happened, such as 9/11 and school shootings, TeenCentral was frequently the place that teens directly affected went to talk.

Parents, too, can write in for help at TeenCentral's sister site, ParentCentral.net.

"Sometimes, parents just don't know what to do to

help their child and we provide them with advice and resources in order to help them be the best parent and best advocate for their child," explains Licata.

TeenCentral and ParentCentral have helped millions of youths navigate through rough times during the past 15 years, says Licata.

According to its web site, TeenCentral.Net is a safe place for teens to:

Tell their story and read stories from other kids who relate to the same feelings;

Hear from peers who respond with support, encouragement and direction;

Receive feedback from professionals who can offer guidance in making decisions;

Find books, movies, music, hotline numbers and organizations that can help, and

Develop confidence in their own abilities and personal worth.

Says Licata: "We have

gotten emails from kids saying things like 'You saved my life. You helped me through a difficult time.'

"No child should have to live with fear or despair. And with TeenCentral, we can offer help."

National KidsDay is held the first Sunday each August. National Family Month runs from Mother's Day to Father's Day each year.

Licata received a BA in Philosophy from Immaculate Conception Seminary, a Master of Divinity from Immaculate Conception Seminary and a PhD in Psychology.

In addition to his position at KidsPeace, Licata is Archbishop of the Old Catholic Apostolic Church of the Americas, Bethlehem, and Pastor of the Cathedral Parish of St. Jude, Bethlehem.



For well-trained trees, remove extra fruit

Young trees loaded with fruit may be a source of pride to home orchardists, but unless the excess fruit is removed they will be small and trees may be damaged.

The first few years after planting, devote your efforts to developing the framework. A few fruit on the side limbs will not interfere with structural development.

Young branches bend easily under a fruit load. If a branch-bending load of fruit is allowed to remain on the tree until harvest, the branch usually will not return to its original position after harvest.

Light to moderate bending helps spread the branches from an upright growing position to a position of about a 30- to 45-degree angle with the trunk.

The main trunk of a young fruit tree is espe-

berries and blackberries, early to mid-June is the time to do something about it.

Summer pinching, or tipping, of black and purple raspberries promotes the development of strong, fruitful lateral shoots. It also produces stronger, stockier plants better able to support their crops and resist wind damage.

Pinch so shoots are about two-feet high on black raspberries and about 2-1/2 feet high on purple raspberries. Pinch erect-growing blackberries at about three feet since they are more vigorous and have stockier plants than raspberries. Do not summer pinch red raspberries and dewberries.

Pinching consists of removing the tops of new canes to the desired height. It's best done with the fingers, but shears may be used. Pinch brambles when

they are dry, and avoid pinching on wet, or on very cloudy days when rain is expected within 24 hours.

After the plants have fruited for this year, prune out the old fruited canes and remove from the planting and discard.

Erect blackberries send up root suckers in addition to the new canes that arise from the crown. Remove all root suckers appearing between the rows. For best results, pull the root suckers out of the ground.

Amnesia has lots of facets

Q. In soap operas, the writers love to include characters with amnesia who don't remember their identities. Is it common for someone to actually forget who they are?

It's extremely rare. People with amnesia usually are aware of their identities. A person's identity is among the most durable long-term memories.

Amnesia, which means loss of memory, comes in several forms.

The most common type is anterograde amnesia. People with this form have trouble learning and making new memories.

Those who suffer from retrograde amnesia have an impaired ability to recall past events and information that were once familiar.

Transient global amnesia is a temporary loss of all memory, but you remember who you are, and you recognize people you know well. It is a rare form of the disorder.

Psychogenic amnesia is caused by trauma such as surviving an explosion. A victim of this form of amnesia can lose personal memories and autobiographical information briefly. This form of amnesia is probably the inspiration for soap opera scribes.

There are different types of memory affected by amnesia. Memory can be divided into:

Immediate: Recalling information a few seconds after learning it.

Short-term: Recalling recently learned information minutes or more after presentation.

Long-term: Memory of remote events occurring months or years ago.

There are other memory definitions:

Procedural memory is about how to perform a task such as knitting.

Declarative memory is about past information or experiences.

Semantic memory is independent of time, such as vocabulary.

Episodic memory is linked to a time such as a birthday.

Prospective memory is about a future occurrence such as a planned meeting.

There are other symptoms of amnesia. These may include confusion, disorientation, seizures, tremors, lack of coordination and false memories.

Any trauma or disease that impacts the brain can affect memory. The following are some causes:

Brain tumors, heart attack, head injury, encephalitis (brain inflammation), stroke, carbon monoxide poisoning, dementia, seizures, electroconvulsive therapy, drugs such as benzodiazepines that treat anxiety.

There are no drugs to treat most types of amnesia. Scientists are looking into brain neurotransmitters hoping to find ways to treat memory disorders.

There are techniques being used to help people with amnesia. These include occupational therapy

'Dragon' whisperer, too

The animated feature sequel, "How To Train Your Dragon 2" (HTTYD2), could have been subtitled "The Dragon Whisperer."

Hiccup (voiced by Jay Baruchel), the lead Dragon Rider, cajoles his charge, Toothless (Randy Thom) back to the fold.

The challenge this time around in "HTTYD2" is that of Drago (voiced by Djimon Hounsou), the evil overlord of the dragons. He controls the dragons to control humans.

Hiccup must overcome the challenge to rally the Vikings and their dragons to ensure his role as heir-apparent and become chief of the Vikings on the island of Berk.

Speaking of "heir," the hair renderings in "HTTYD2" are amazing, none more so than on the huge ginger beard of Hiccup's dad. Stoick (voiced by Gerard Butler). The animation throughout is superb. Hiccup's leather Viking outfit, and his girlfriend Astrid's fur-covered outfit, replete with mukluk-style boots, are very trendy.

Fashionista observations aside, "HTTYD2" has gorgeous artwork, from huge, expressive eyes and facile facial expressions of the characters, to colorful and imaginative dragons, to detailed buildings, ships, landscape, sea and sky.

That's why, though the movie was seen in the 2D format for this review, particular scenes, including memory flashbacks and dragon-flying (of which, to quote a cliché, there is a "veritable plethora"), might be worth the added ticket cost to see the movie in the 3D and/or Imax format.

"HTTYD2" also can be recommended on the basis of story, plot and pace. Director Dean DeBlois (Oscar-nominated writer-director, "How To Train Your Dragon," 2010, and "Lilo & Stitch," 2002) judiciously mixes elements of humor ("Stop being so stoic, Stoick.") amidst the action scenes, effectively uses close-ups of main characters and lingers on the characters in scenes where character response is important. Otherwise, the movie flies along on dragon wings.

The music by John Powell ("How To Train Your Dragon") has lots of soaring choral work, which enhances the visuals' majesty.

Jay Baruchel's vocal work for Hiccup at first seems a bit underplayed, but his approach works well in terms of the character's timidity.

Cate Blanchett invigorates the character of Valka. America Ferrera as Astrid is compelling.

In supporting voice character roles are Jonah Hill (Snotlout), Kristin Wiig (Ruffnut) and Craig Ferguson (Gobber).

An interesting aspect of the storyline is that Hiccup has an artificial leg. It's positive to see a person with a disability in a heroic leading role.

"HTTYD2" is among the few movies of the summer 2014 blockbuster season so far that can be embraced by nearly the entire family. Children should enjoy the human characters and love the dragon characters. And there's a lot of fun for teens, young adults, parents and guardians.



Neufville was able to return home a few days before graduation from a three-month deployment in Afghanistan. The soldier stayed out of contact with his three sons by staying with relatives until the night of the graduation. When he appeared unexpectedly, the emotion of the reunion between he and his family spread throughout the auditorium.
