

After the ceremony Assistant Superintendent Dr. Jack Silva said that the success of similar athletic signings gave movement to replicating the signing experience for academic achievers.



For well-trained trees, remove extra fruit

Young trees loaded with fruit may be a source of pride to home orchardists, but unless the excess fruit L.C. Cooperative is removed they will be small and trees may be damaged.

The first few years after planting, devote your efforts to developing the framework. A few fruit on the side limbs will not interfere with structural development.

Young branches bend easily under a fruit load. If a branch-bending load of fruit is allowed to remain on the tree until harvest, the branch usually will not return to its original position after harvest.

Light to moderate bending helps spread the branches from an upright growing position to a position of about a 30- to 45degree angle with the trunk.

The main trunk of a young fruit tree is espe-



cially vulnerable to bending from fruit load. This bending changes the leader into a fruiting branch and the central leader is lost. Dwarf apple trees especially are likely to lose their central

leader from fruiting. Remove all of the fruit from the one- and two-year portions of the central leader. Do the same for the branches if excessive bending starts.

After a strong framework has been developed, heavier bearing can be tolerated. But excessive bearing can alter the structure of well-trained trees.

Summer pinching

If you want to increase next year's crop of rasp-

berries and blackberries, early to mid-June is the time to do something about it.

Summer pinching, or tipping, of black and purple raspberries promotes the development of strong, fruitful lateral shoots. It also produces stronger, stockier plants better able to support their crops and resist wind damage.

Pinch so shoots are about two-feet high on black raspberries and about 2-1/2 feet high on purple raspberries. Pinch erect-growing blackberries at about three feet since they are more vigorous and have stockier plants than raspberries. Do not summer pinch red raspberries and dewberries.

Pinching consists of removing the tops of new canes to the desired height. It's best done with the fingers, but shears may be used. Pinch brambles when

the writers love to include characters with amnesia who don't remember their identities. Is it common for someone to actually forget who they are?

It's extremely rare. People with amnesia usual ly are aware of their identities. A person's identity is among the most durable long-term memories. Amnesia, which means

loss of memory, comes in several forms. The most common type

is anterograde amnesia. People with this form have trouble learning and mak

ing new memories. Those who suffer from retrograde amnesia have an impaired ability to recall past events and information that were once familiar.

Transient global amnesia is a temporary loss of all memory, but you remember who you are, and you recognize people you know well. It is a rare form of the disorder.

Psychogenic amnesia is caused by trauma such as surviving an explosion. A victim of this form of amnesia can lose personal memories and autobiographical information briefly. This form of amnesia is probably the inspiration for soap opera scribes. There are different

types of memory affect-ed by amnesia. Memory can be divided into: Immediate: Recalling information a few seconds

after learning it. Short-term: Recalling recently learned information minutes or more after presentation.

Long-term: Memory of remote events occurring months or years ago.

There are other memory definitions: Procedural memory is about how to perform a task such as knitting.

but I am still thinking about the man my mother says she picked for me.

It was stranger still, considering I loved my own father as much as life itself. I thought he was the sun, the moon and the most fun of any father on the planet.

While their divorce was tough on me, I wasn't upset when she said she was marrying again. From the time she was a kid to the years she was married to my father, she had a tough life. If she could partner with someone who made life easier for her, I was all for it.

But I must say it didn't make sense to me when she turned to me a few days before her wedding to Ziggy and said: "I'm doing this for you. I picked him with my kids in mind."

I was 14 at the time. That's a confusing enough time for a kid. I never asked my mother exactly what she meant by that. I discovered it for myself.

Ziggy was always quiet and good to my brother and me. He took us for pizza as a family every Friday night and tried hard to make us one happy family.

I never said it out loud, but I knew in my heart there was only one thing wrong with that picture. My father, the man I called "my real father" wasn't in the picture. He was hundreds of miles away with a new family of his own

When I was 19, I fell victim to a serious case of meningitis caused by a mosquito bite. When the ambulance attendants were carrying me on stretcher down the second floor steps, I happened to see Ziggy's tears. The gentle giant couldn't stop crying.

Even in my feverinduced state, what became clear to me was that Ziggy did, indeed, love me. I understood then what my mother meant when she said she was picking him for her children.

He was everything she thought he would be, and a whole lot more. When mother mv got Alzheimer's and had to go in a nursing home, Ziggy drove an hour every single day to spend time with her. The tender way he stroked her face said a lot about his love and his faithfulness.

Even after my mother passed away, I stayed close with Ziggy, loving him more every year.


