Six fighting sons of the Uhls are now in the armed forces of our country! With the re-enlistment in March of the last of the Uhl boys, six brothers have contributed a total of 28 years to the service of Uncle Sam.

Second of the sons, Charles R. Uhl, 32, re-enlisted March 29, 1944, and is now in Officers training school at Fort Trumbull, New Lonschool at Fort Trumbull, New London, Conn. Before the outbreak of the present conflict, Charles served two and one half years in Hawail with the U. S. Army and four years with the Navy. Since he is married to the former Edna Fox, of Quakertown and the father of two children, friends imagined that he would be content with civilian life.
