Reds Liberate Pfc. Conahan From Prison

Pfc. P. Joseph Conahan, son of Dr. and Mrs. F. J. Conahan, 114 West Fourth Street, was liberated from a German prison on May 2 by the Russians, according to a letter from the young soldier received today by his parents. The letter was dated May 14.

"My next move is westward and I hope to be home soon," was the welcome message embodied in the missive.

Pfc. Conahan was taken prisoner by the Nazis in September, while engaged with one of the units of the Seventh Army, and for some time was confined in the camp known as Stalag 2-B.

He told his parents that his captors moved him from the camp to a point some distance west of Berlin. The last letter they received from him while a prisoner was in December. missive.

He further added that after his release he was flown from Luenburg to Wismar, Germany, and later taken to a Canadian transit camp at Brussels.
